


HAVING STAFF BE CONSIDERED subject matter experts is critical to the success of our dynamic strategy to Be Exceptional. If our staff are seen as leaders in their industry, then HCDE, where they practice this expertise daily, is likely considered a thought leader by extension. This type of synergy, with staff leading out in their area of professional expertise, will naturally elevate the reputation of HCDE around the state and country, as other educational leaders see our employees as outstanding representatives of the industry and aspire to emulate HCDE's success.

We saw this goal come closer to reality this week with Dr. Teryana Lamb, compliance manager with the Center for Educator Success, being named president of the Texas Association of Certification Officers. As president of TACO, Dr. Lamb is in a position where she can influence discussions about teacher certification. In this role, she will naturally be seen as a leader in the industry, fostering conversations about how to impact the teacher shortage and get more teachers ready for the classroom. This leadership role will naturally extend to CES and the work they are doing with school districts in Harris County, while also elevating HCDE's standing in this arena. It is exciting to see how the small steps our staff take can have such a huge impact on HCDE's footprint overall. I am proud of Dr. Lamb's accomplishments, and I look forward to seeing how CES and HCDE grow their influence as standard bearers in teacher certification circles.

I started the week with ELT on Monday, followed by standing meetings with staff. On Monday we opened registration for the Tools for Teachers 2023 initiative, with the 2,000 slots filling up in just a few hours. This is a great indicator of the need for the program and just more proof that HCDE and the foundation are filling the gaps in public education locally. Shopping opens for eligible teachers on October 9.

On Tuesday, I met with staff to discuss ongoing projects and initiatives and on Wednesday I attended Houston Mayor Sylvester's final State of the City. On Thursday I traveled to Dallas for the Texas Association of School Administrators/ Texas Association of School Boards (TASA/TASB) annual conference. This is a great opportunity to hear what other districts and school boards are doing and the challenges they face in their communities. Today I participated in the Superintendent's Leadership Lab at the conference, a discussion with superintendents from around the state focused on issues facing public schools today.

I will return to Houston on Sunday. Have a fabulous weekend.

DR. TERYANA LAMB MAKES HISTORY AS FIRST AFRICAN-AMERICAN PRESIDENT OF TEXAS ASSOCIATION OF CERTIFICATION OFFICERS

HARRIS COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION is known for hiring top talent, and that proves true as one employee made history at the state level. Dr. Teryana Lamb, Manager of Compliance, Recruitment, and Data for the Center for Educator Success (CES), was recently elected as the first African-American President of the Texas Association of Certification Officers (TACO).

“I was shocked when I was nominated because I’m usually in the background as a worker bee, getting the

job done,” said Lamb. “I didn’t realize my associates were listening when I voiced my concerns on issues across the state, but I’m excited about this new journey and honored to represent TACO and make history within this organization.”

TACO is a member organization of the Consortium of State Organizations for Texas Teacher Education (CSOTTE), a nonprofit dedicated to supporting and refining development

programs for school personnel in Texas. TACO is a forum where educators can share ideas and common concerns while providing an organizational framework to improve the quality of teacher and administrator certification.

Lamb is a native Houstonian with more than 20 years of educational experience who began her career as a chemistry teacher in the Houston Independent School District. She

While obtaining a master's and doctorate from Texas Southern University in Higher Education Administration, she gained a wealth of knowledge exploring the administrative side of becoming a certified teacher in Texas.

Lamb joined TACO in 2016 while employed as a teacher education certification and compliance coordinator at the University of Houston-Downtown. She specialized in identifying UHD graduates who would be solid teacher certification program candidates. Lamb quickly became a bold advocate for Harris County pre-service teachers and their needs after witnessing first-hand the challenges teachers face while seeking state certifications, specifically minority applicants.

"I noticed teacher candidates of color have a challenge with passing the certification exams, and I wanted to be on the ground level as we implemented changes that impacted all teacher candidates," Lamb said.

Peers voted Lamb TACO President-Elect in the summer of 2022, where Lamb continued to advocate for incoming teachers and worked to update the Texas Administrative Code to support Districts of Innovation (DOI) hiring non-certified teachers. Lamb's work to update state code persists as she steps into her new role as president.

While impacting education at the state level, Lamb described wanting to bring policy knowledge and improved practices back to HCDE and the Center for Educator Success.

"This position allows the CES to be in the room where decisions happen," Lamb smiled. "It gives our division a leg up to know changes coming down the pipeline and better prepare applicants participating in our certification program."

Lamb will serve as President of TACO for the 2023-2024 school year. 🌟

ABS WEST'S FIESTA OF COLORS IN HONOR OF HISPANIC HERITAGE MONTH

ACADEMIC AND BEHAVIOR SCHOOL WEST recognized Hispanic Heritage Month during a luncheon this week. Middle and high school students honored the rich contributions, histories, and traditions of people with Hispanic ancestry.

Middle school students from teacher Yakia Hall's class facilitated a Q&A session for students about the observance, detailing the dates when U.S. Presidents signed Hispanic Heritage Month into law, why the nation celebrates the holiday, and the significance of the days between September 15 and October 15. The group also engaged the audience by listing the countries that Hispanic heritage observes during the month, including Chile, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Mexico, and Spain.

Seven high school students presented their research projects highlighting prominent figures, historical events, and popular modern-day Hispanic recipes based on traditional dishes.

"As educators, we are responsible for informing our students about different parts of the world and how people live," ABS

West Principal Jatata Hutton said. "Since our campus and staff are so diverse, it's easy to appreciate and celebrate Hispanic Heritage."

Hutton also used the luncheon to acknowledge Clifford Tompkins, the school's first student to transition back to their home campus during the 2023-2024 school year. Originally from Waller Independent School District, Tompkins has been at ABS West for three years, working with staff to correct several behavioral challenges. Tompkins returned to his home campus on Wednesday.

"This is a peek into the future of our plans at ABS West," Hutton said proudly. "Clifford is an example for our other students that you can return to your home district, and that success is possible. This is only the beginning, and I'm excited for what's to come."

Before returning to class, select students were invited to the gymnasium for a chance to break open one of two piñatas. The group smiled and laughed as students rushed to get their favorite Spanish candy. 🌟
