Teacher Certification Program

- District Partnerships
- Partnership with Center for Transforming Alternative Preparation Pathways- \$50,000 per year for 3 years.
- Teacher Preparation Inspection-Grant for \$40,000 and ongoing technical support.
- Teach for Houston Partnership
- Houston Region Teacher Pipeline Community of Practice







Trends

- Low teacher morale
- > Teachers leaving the profession
- Understaffed schools
- Uncertified new teachers in Texas are:
 - 1.4 times more likely to teach black students than white students.
 - 2.1 times more likely to teach emergent bilingual students than native English-speaking students
 - 6 times more likely to teach students in rural communities than in suburban communities.

Trends

- Uncertified teachers negatively impact students' academic achievement
- Uncertified teachers impact historically marginalized student populations
- ➤ Having an uncertified teacher is equivalent to missing up to 3 months of instruction
- Uncertified teachers have been linked to lower test scores
- > Teacher turnover is expensive
