Our History

Harris County Department of Education, or HCDE, is a separate and distinct entity from county agencies of Harris County, Texas. The Department's primary service area covers 1,788 square miles. We offer services to 25 rural, suburban and urban school districts located either entirely or partially within Harris County; to neighboring school districts and governmental agencies in surrounding counties; and to schools, education services centers and other governmental agencies statewide.

In January 1999, HCDE became a Head Start grantee. Our Head Start service area covers approximately 600 square miles of the northeast and southeast portions of Harris County. Our boundary extends north to Humble and Huffman. HCDE's eastern service delivery area includes Crosby, Baytown and LaPorte. To the south, the area east of I-45 includes Clear Creek, Pasadena and Deer Park. We operate 14 campuses which are strategically located to serve over 1,250 children. Within the Early Child Care Partnership, we serve 100 additional children at six community child care centers in our service area.

I am pleased to present the Head Start 2021-22 Annual Report highlighting our program performance and activities. Although COVID-19 continued to linger, along with mask mandates and vaccination requirements, HCDE's Head Start Team worked hard to ensure our students and staff flourished as we returned to in-person services.

The pandemic continued to present challenges this year including impacting our ability to fully enroll the program. Prior to COVID, HCDE Head Start boasted full enrollment with a 20% viable wait list per campus. In addition, we experienced increased staff resignations and hiring challenges. Additionally, the LaPorte Head Start campus received a face lift just in time to accommodate the new Early Head Start services.

Their support and positive attitude were critical in advancing our family and education services during these unprecedented times. Additionally, we could not have accomplished all we did without the support of the Office of Head Start Region 6 program team.

RESPONSIBLE PARENTING AWARD

“Making wishes for wheels come true”

Two Head Start moms now have the peace of mind of owning a reliable car since being awarded the 2021 Bates Collision Centers Responsible Parenting Award. Sheffield mom Destini Rhodes was presented with a 2013 Mazda3 and Pugh mom Alionuska Perez received a 2011 Equinox at two separate special events in December.

“This award is about somebody who is really determined to take care of their family,” said Leila

Bates, owner with her husband Lee of Bates Collision Centers in Baytown and Channelview.

Bates said despite their hardships, both women who are single moms, have been working hard to move their families forward by setting goals and working towards those goals. By taking away the burden of transportation, Bates said more opportunities will be available to both them.

Rhodes, 28, had been borrowing a car to transport her two youngest children, 4 year-old Jo’el, who has autism, and Sofia, 3, to school and get to and from

work as a Head Start teaching assistant. Rhodes is studying for an associate's degree in early education. Despite the load, Rhodes has stayed involved in the education needs of all her children, including 12 year-old Serina.

"A reliable car would take a lot of stress out of my life, and I won't be so dependent on others," Rhodes stated.

Perez, who has a son Jencarlos , 3, and a 19 year-old daughter Adianet, has been using the train to get to and from work cleaning buildings. Jencarlos' father helps with childcare.

"A car would enable me to participate in more activities with Jencarlos and to take him to the park," she stated.

The cars came with all kinds of gifts from employees, vendors, family and friends, including oil change and 6 months of car insurance from AMI Insurance and Heritage Credit Union.

"I have to give credit to our team — they are the ones volunteering their time — all hands were on deck for this," Bates said of the 23-year tradition of giving reliable vehicles to deserving families in need.

HOW WE LEARN

Lessons through Songs, Stories, and Activities that Empower Children and Parents

Students enrolled in our Head Start and Early Head Start programs are exposed to a variety of learning opportunities using the Frog Street Infant, Toddler, and Prekindergarten curriculums. On our HISD collaboration campuses, students are exposed to learning opportunities via the SAVVAS Three Cheers for PreK curriculum. These comprehensive curriculums assist staff with empowering parents to be equal partners in their children’s education while boosting language and literacy skills through songs, stories, and other activities. Our curriculums serve as the content and plan for instruction that our staff provides to students during the school day. Our curriculums are research-based, and Texas TEA approved for their respected grade-levels and made up of instructional resources and methods needed to help students develop critical skills and knowledge.

The curriculums also enable teaching staff to enhance students’ abilities while building on concepts and skills. With all curriculums utilized in our program, students can learn at their own pace and are presented with opportunities to take part in individualized instruction, small groups, and whole group experiences. These activities result in students being actively engaged in purposeful and meaningful differentiated instruction.

This year we have also included the Skill-Streaming supplemental curriculum to increase student gains in social and emotional development. These skills help prepare students for daily interactions with peers and adults while working to increase their ability to self-regulate their emotions. When we reflect on the data, we can note our students’ knowledge and skills are flourishing with Frog Street and Three Cheers for PreK curriculums.

During the 2021-2022 school year, infant and toddler students were formally assessed during the beginning-of-year (BOY), middle-of-year (MOY) and end-of-year (EOY) assessment points using the Frog Street Developmental Checklist.

Our Head Start 3- and 4-year-old students were assessed using the CLI Engage Circle Progress Monitoring Assessment during the same time frames for BOY, MOY, and EOY.

In addition to these assessments, teaching staff conducted informal observations of students to document student progress in all domain areas. Teaching staff created concrete descriptions of what they observed and documented their observations on anecdotal notes.

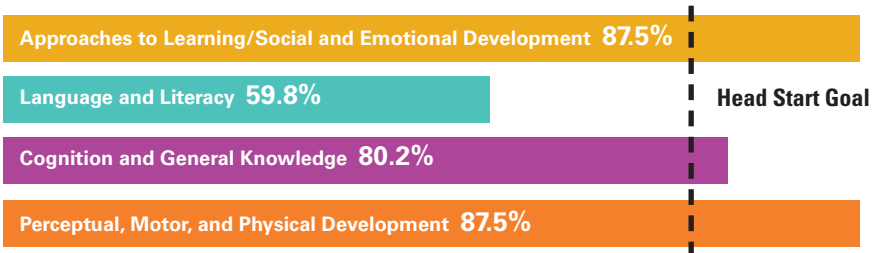
These notes, as well as samples of students work, were randomly collected throughout the school year to create the student’s individual portfolio.

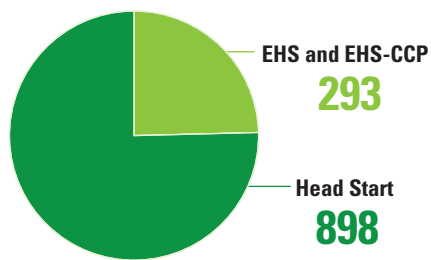

Mid-Year Assessment Results for Four-Year-Olds

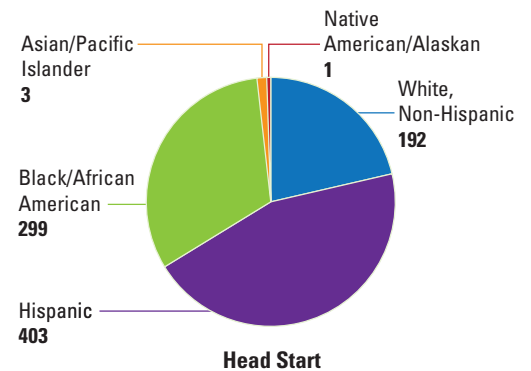
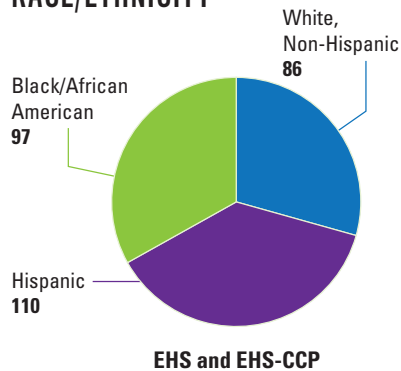


2021-2022 STATISTICS

CUMULATIVE ENROLLMENT

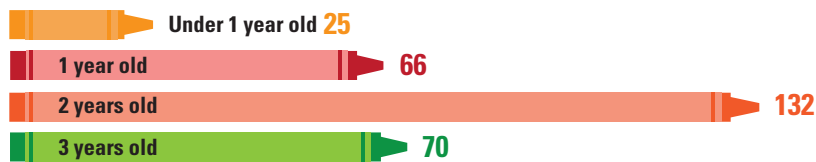

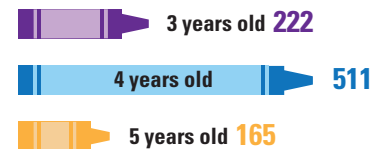


ENROLLMENT BY AGE

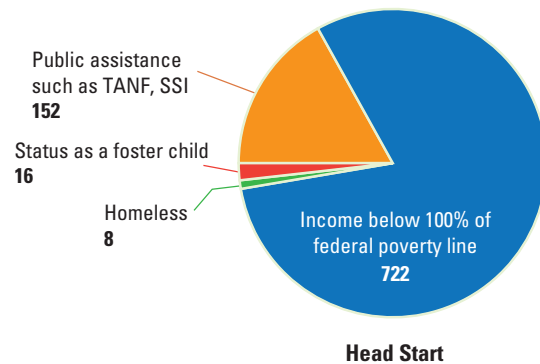
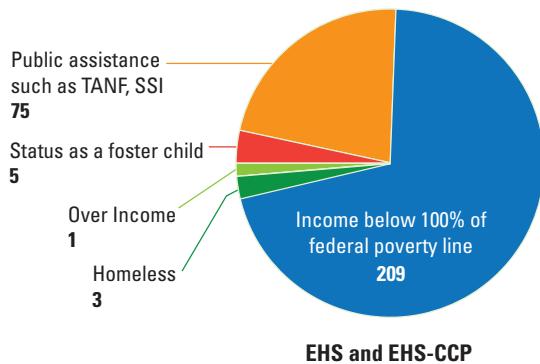

PARENT SPOTLIGHT

An emotional, full-circle moment for a former J.D. Walker Head Start mom

In 2004, twenty-year-old Corina Guzman cried tears of joy when she was awarded HCDE Head Start and Bates Collision Centers' Annual Responsible Parenting Award, an honor that recognizes the sacrifices parents often make to provide for their children.

Eighteen years later, Guzman is still crying those same tears of joy.

At the time, Guzman was a single mother working to build a life for her son, Alfonso, who was enrolled at J.D. Walker Head Start campus in Baytown. She was working as a bartender and making ends meet as she saved up for a car after hers was totaled in an accident. JD Walker staff nominated her for the the Annual Responsible Parenting Award and Guzman became the second family to receive a rehabbed vehicle packed full of wrapped presents for their children just in time for the holidays.

Guzman said the car was life-changing. So much so that when she received an email at her current job at an oil and gas company in 2021 about partnering with Bates for the holiday program, she knew her life had come full circle.



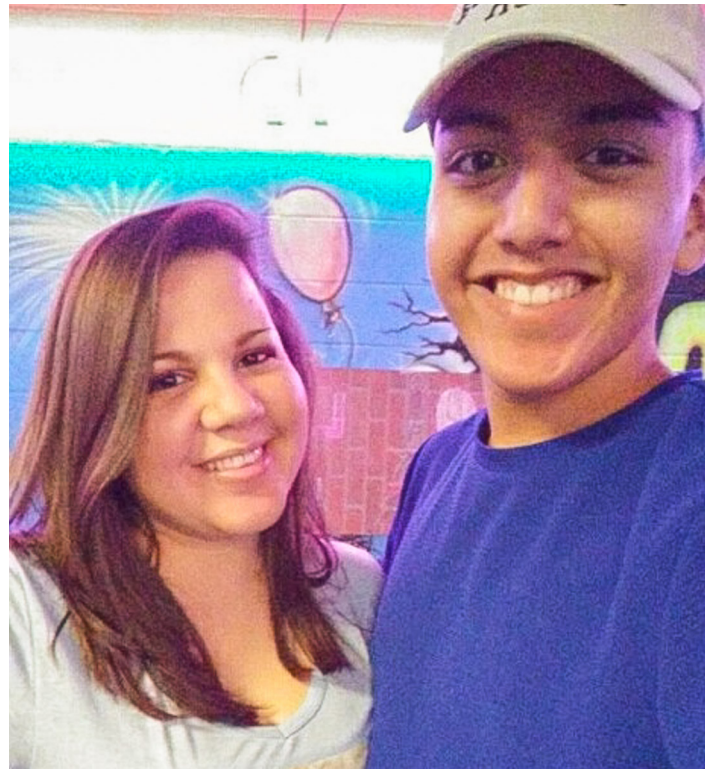

"What are the chances that my company would partner with Bates? I was one of those parents almost two decades ago, and now I work for a company that wants to help parents like me," Guzman said. "I ran to her office, in tears, and told her my situation. She started crying, too."

Guzman quietly attended the 2022 presentation at the Baytown Bates Collision Center, with her HR manager telling Bates Collision Center co-owner Leila Bates that Guzman was actually a prior recipient.

"That moment was priceless," said Leila. "Corina's story touched us in several ways. It filled our hearts to be able to hear first-hand how much our gift of transportation from 18 years ago had impacted her family's life. It was especially touching for several of our employees who had worked on her car and are still employed with us and who continue donating their time to this program year after year."

"They have no idea how much they impact the people they choose for this award, and in more ways than they'll ever know," said an emotional Guzman. "And as long as I'm at Sentinel, I will definitely make sure that we continue partnering with Head Start and Bates."

XFL Arlington Renegades Running Back Remembers Time at Coolwood Head Start

The imagination of a child is boundless. For 23-year-old De'Montre Tuggle, his time as a student at Coolwood Head Start showed his imagination could take him places when he was drafted by the XFL's Arlington Renegades last year.

Tuggle's former teacher, Patricia Kuskos, who was in her first year of teaching when Tuggle was a three-year-old in her class, remembers him as a quiet and kind student.

"I believe Head Start built his self-esteem because he was very reserved when he came. He left with a rich vocabulary, outgoing, engaged, and very curious," Kuskos said. "I think when you have a solid foundation and a trusting relationship, a good teacher can help you build social skills."

After graduating from Channelview High School as a two-time first-team all-district selection, Tuggle went on to the University of Central Arkansas, Kilgore College, Ohio University, and eventually, an invitation to the Chicago Bears minicamp.

"Being in all of these different places, like in Chicago around millionaires, and just being able to still be me, I definitely really feel like it started at Head Start," said Tuggle, who reunited with Kuskos, who still works in Head Start at HCDE, in December after 20 years.

Kuskos believes parental involvement is vital because it establishes engagement in a child's education for life. She noted that she often becomes a part of the family when parents volunteers and engage with the program.

"One of the things with Head Start is that we also want to provide opportunities for parents to grow, and parent involvement is a big component of what we do," said Kuskos. "I always tell [our families], once our paths have crossed, you have me for the rest of your life."

For Kuskos, sharing Tuggle's story is about dreaming big. Tuggle agrees and said education is the great equalizer, opening up opportunities for students and their future.

"America looks up to professional athletes, but it is just as important to get an academic scholarship as it is to get a sports scholarship," Kuskos said. "I think he got a little bit of both—and that's important."

Wisdom and positivity: Cornerstones of Employee of the Month Janny Leiva

It's early on a Monday morning. Her feet move quickly, and she's already sweeping the entryway, wiping down windows and toys, rolling lunch carts into classrooms, and chatting with colleagues.

La Porte Head Start custodian Janny Leiva, Harris County Department of Education's November Employee of the Month, wastes no time. "The day is too short," she affirms.

"SHE IS THE LA PORTE HEAD START GRANDMA... THE HEART AND SOUL OF THIS CENTER. I THINK SHE IS A RARE, RARE BREED."

"It's amazing! It's like she's a robot!" exclaims La Porte Head Start Campus Manager Nadia Epps. "She is the La Porte Head Start grandma... the heart and soul of this center. I think she is a rare, rare breed."

Leiva, a breast cancer survivor and a political asylee from Nicaragua who emigrated to the US 33 years ago, moves through the world with the wisdom of experience and the optimism of faith. Her desire to make the world a better place propels her.

"God has given me many second chances. [When I was diagnosed] with cancer 10 years ago, they gave me six months to live," she said. "I am happy seeing other people happy. Happiness is not selfishly in oneself," affirms Leiva.

Leiva was hired at Head Start in January 2022. After Winter Storm Uri, the La Porte Head Start campus sustained flooding damage and Leiva was temporarily reassigned to the Baytown center.

"You have to help those in need, and I knew there was a greater need [at the Baytown Center]," says Leiva. "Because of COVID, they were short-staffed, so when I returned, I had to start from zero. You had to learn how to do a little bit of everything."

Epps attributes the positive culture on the campus largely to the love and care that Leiva puts into her work and bestows onto others. She said Leiva treats the staff like family.

"This is our center. This is our home. You have to make life easier for people, more comfortable so they can give 100%," Leiva said. "If they are happy, the children are happy...I try to create a positive environment so that the children and staff want to return the next day."

The revenues for FY 2021-2022 as compared to FY 2020-2021 increased by \$813,965 or 1% mainly due to increase in federal sources.

ABOUT HARRIS COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

Harris County Department of Education is an educational service provider in the heart of Houston, supporting all 25 local school districts and thousands of students and educators each year. HCDE is dedicated to supporting public education in the county and region through high quality services including special schools, school safety training, teacher certification programs and adult education. HCDE also supports hundreds of regional government and non-profit agencies through other operational services including a national purchasing cooperative that funnels millions of dollars back into support for public education each year.

HCDE has the smallest tax on a Harris County property tax bill, costing the average homeowner less than \$10 a year for its services. Through fees-for-service and local, state and federal grants, HCDE leverages its revenue to turn every \$1 of property taxes into \$5 of services.

Special Schools: HCDE runs four special schools supporting students with profound special needs as well as those facing addiction and adjudicated youth. HCDE contracts with more than 40 regional school districts for seats in these schools each year. HCDE recently opened two new Academic and Behavior School campuses specifically designed to support students with multiple disabilities including inclusive playgrounds for students in wheelchairs.

School-Based Therapy: HCDE provides more than 54% of all school-based therapy in Harris County. Through the work of more than 150 occupational, physical and music therapists, HCDE provides essential support to students with special needs in their classroom and 100% of all therapy in Houston ISD, CyFair ISD, Spring Branch ISD, Katy ISD and Spring ISD. HCDE has been providing school-based therapy in Harris County for more than 40 years.

Afterschool Programs: HCDE's Center for AfterSchool Enrichment (CASE for Kids) program is a regional broker of afterschool programming, providing curriculum, training, resources and funding to hundreds of local childcare providers and school districts. CASE seeks to strengthen, support and sustain out-of-school time activities, connecting the community with opportunities for youth. CASE partners with the Houston Urban Debate League to provide debate coaches to area high schools, with several CASE debate teams winning at the national level in the last few years. CASE also operates a regional robotics tournament, the All-Earth Ecobot Challenge, at which hundreds of students showcase their STEM skills and knowledge.

Adult Education: HCDE runs a robust Adult Education program offering free high school equivalency diploma, English as a Second Language and workforce training courses to members of the community. Students can participate in citizenship classes and gain useful work skills through qualified certificate programs such as front office assistant and Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA).

Center For Safe And Secure Schools: HCDE is a leader in school safety throughout the state, providing both physical and emotional safety support for local school districts. CSSS was born in 1999 at the request of local

school superintendents in the wake of the Columbine tragedy. More than 20 years later, the Center continues to be a leader in school safety providing building safety audits, crisis preparedness training, reunification exercises, restorative circles for culture and climate building within schools and training on best practices for delivering quality trauma-informed instruction to students in need.

Center For Educator Success: In 2022, HCDE combined its Teaching and Learning Center and teacher alternative certification programs into the Center for Educator Success (CES). CES is dedicated to helping local school districts recruit and retain high quality teachers through certification coursework and test preparation as well as retention support throughout a teacher's first year on the job. CES contracts with local school districts to certify paraprofessionals and help those currently in certification programs achieve their goal of becoming a teacher in a Houston area school.

Records Management: HCDE's Records Management division stores both physical and digital records for local school districts and municipalities. Records Management provides safe and secure storage options through boxes in our local warehouse as well as in the digital realm through an online portal which allows clients immediate access to their electronic records.

Choice Partners Purchasing Cooperative: HCDE hosts a national purchasing cooperative dedicated to offering local government high quality, federally compliant contracts to save agencies more than \$100 million each year through streamlined procurement processes. Choice Partners is not only EDGAR and CFR-200 compliant, but also offers contracts with Amazon and Apple Inc., allowing governmental entities and non-profit organizations to use federal dollars for procurement of goods and services from these providers.





The Harris County Department of Education (HCDE) is dedicated to providing high-quality, cost-effective educational services to school districts, educators, government and non-profit organizations in Harris County.

Through schools for students with profound special needs, Head Start early childhood education, school-based therapy services and afterschool programs, HCDE supports all area school districts in meeting the needs of uniquely challenged learners while saving them millions of dollars each year through shared services. The Department is an innovative leader of literacy and workforce development programming for adult learners across the county. HCDE also provides various other educational support services including professional development for educators, school safety programs, educator certification, records management, and a national purchasing cooperative.

HCDE impacts an average of 150,000 students and educators each year. Using fees for service, grants, and the purchasing cooperative, HCDE turns one dollar of property taxes into five dollars of services.

HCDE is separate and distinct from other agencies of Harris County. The Department's primary service area covers 1,788 square miles but also provides support to school districts, education service centers and other governmental agencies across Texas and the nation.

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
