### Board

### Schools

It’s hard to believe that we’re already nearing the end of the first semester of this academic year! Our Schools division is wrapping up the fall semester within the next two weeks. The same is true for the 25 Harris County school districts. On that note, I’m pleased to report that as we close out the first semester, our Highpoint School-East location has an enrollment of 107 students. Our Highpoint School-North location is currently engaging an existing client district in increasing its contract by 25 additional students. Our Academic and Behavior School campuses are performing equally well and all four HCDE campus locations have experienced great successes this semester.

### Leadership

This week, in addition to my weekly Executive Leadership Team (ELT) Meeting, I also convened my monthly Leadership Team Meeting. These meetings serve as an ideal opportunity for division directors, campus principals, and members of the ELT to come together, and tune into how, as a whole, we’re moving the Department forward in perfect alignment with our mission and goals. It is at these meetings that our systemic achievement—with purposeful intent—is in panoramic view. Our Schools division is realizing exceptional results during its implementation of the Edgenuity and especially in its Edgenuity Center for Excellence. Our Records Management division estimates that it’s just 45 short days away from becoming a paperless environment and that’s no small feat. Great things are happening at HCDE.

### Advancing Teaching and Learning

Our Teaching and Learning Center performed yet another yeoman’s job of training Harris County area educators this week. We started off the week hosting a Bilingual 164 TExES Supplemental Test Review. The week continued with us hosting a meeting of the Houston Science Educators’ Leadership Association and a test prep series for TExES BTLPT exam. ### Harris County Department of Education Board of Trustees Appoints Louis Evans to Serve Remainder of Term for Kay Smith



Louis D. Evans, III was appointed to serve as HCDE Board of Trustee, Position 4, on November 30 to complete the remainder of the term for HCDE Board Vice President Kay Smith. Smith resigned her position to run for Texas State Representative District 130.

Evans, the executive director of distance education at the University of Houston-Downtown, served on the board from 2007 through 2012 and provided leadership as vice president from 2010 to 2012.

HCDE Board of Trustees voted on Evans' appointment in a special board meeting. Evans was sworn into oath following the meeting to serve the remainder of Smith's six-year term through 2018.

"We welcome Mr. Evans back to our board," said HCDE Board President Angie Chesnut. "His leadership and experience in education will be a great asset to our Harris County community."

### HISD Teens Present Human Trafficking Mapping Project, Explore Geographic Information Systems Careers at Event Held at HCDE

When five High School for Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice High School students took on a project to track and map human traffickers in Houston, they never imagined they would be presenting their findings to 245 fellow geographic information systems enthusiasts at Harris County Department of Education.

The students are enrolled in a national security class in a career technology track with teacher Valgene Holmes. The panel of five Houston Independent School District students presented at the Houston Area Geographic Information Systems Day 2015 on November 19.

HCDE hosted the event as part of its commitment to support science, technology, engineering and mathematics, or STEM activities in public school. GIS industry specialists from governmental organizations such as the City of Houston, the City of Stafford and the Port of Houston Authority


have promoted and supported the student day since 2001. Science curriculum director Lisa Felske says GIS mapping touches almost every industry, including medical, oil and gas, public works and law enforcement.

“Our students are learning about GIS so that they can explore the different career paths which are going to give them opportunities,” said their teacher Valgene Holmes.

Senior Josue Soto said he is hopeful about using GIS to track his career options.

“I could work with the City of Houston or other governmental agencies,” he said. “I could work on making maps for infrastructure and transportation.”

Applying the GIS mapping to projects helps students attach the science to real-life situations and future professions, Holmes explained. Last year his students used GIS mapping to track sex offenders within proximity to schools. That information was fed to law enforcement to make several arrests, he said.

### 4 Students Highlighted in Story to Promote Adult Education National Honor Society 2015



Stories from four Adult Education students will be showcased to media and through the HCDE website as part of the Adult Education National Honor Society ceremony on December 11 at 10 a.m. at 6300 Irvington. Many more stories will be told on the day that 20 students will be honored as outstanding students and leaders as they are inducted by Dr. Eduardo Honold, Adult Education director.

Students include Edgar Garcia, an immigrant who survived a near-death experience which changed his life goals. Another is Raquel Lopez, a 54-year-old breast cancer survivor from Deer Park who is also committed to helping her peers in class accomplish their goals. A third student is Alief student Marianna Lende Khellah, a student from Sierra Leone who is stricken with lupus and undergoes nightly dialysis. Joseph Jeremy Gonzalez, a Bear Creek area student, is working part-time for a moving company so that he can complete his GED and to study to become an EMT through a local community college. Because he dropped out of school at age 17, it has taken him a full year to study for all parts of the new rigorous GED exam.



### Science Curriculum Director Felske Presents to State Board of Education about Science TEKS Revisions

Teaching and Learning Center Science Curriculum Director Lisa Felske presented to the Texas State Board of Education upon the request of member Barbara Cargill in November. Currently there is a push to streamline versus rewrite the science Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills, or TEKS. Felske was asked to present her interpretation on streamlining revisions. She also expanded on her opinion about why she thought all of the science should not be rewritten.

Felske answered numerous questions during the presentation and was also asked to stay afterwards as an expert for an lengthy discussion about the science TEKS.
