It was an engaging week, for both HCDE and me, replete with events and activities related to our various programs and services. As mentioned in last week's issue of **The Connector**, this week our Head Start division celebrated the Week of the Young Child with tours of two of our Head Start locations. To mention just a few others, this past Saturday, CASE for Kids held its Spring 2016 Symposium, and for the latter part of this week, IO Harris County superintendents and I attended leadership training at the United States Army War College (USAWC).

As we embark upon the last several weeks of the school year, we continue to create value, deliver opportunity, and provide service to the school districts of Harris County and to the community at-large. This week, we hosted workshops ranging from STAAR test strategies to CPR/First Aid, to Homework Help and grants and funding, plus a lot more. On Wednesday of this week, Focal Point participants and I departed Houston for executive leadership development training in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania at the USAWC. The events of this experience kicked off Wednesday evening at a dinner hosted by the office of the Assistant Commandant of Outreach and Advancement for the USAWC. The college's historian, Steven Knott, conducted the Gettysburg Campaign Overview which provided extensive history of this famous campaign, from a military perspective.

We entered the nuts and bolts of this experience yesterday during the Gettysburg Strategic Leader Staff Ride as we departed for the Gettysburg Battlefield to visit the nine pivotal locations of this historic war. The point of this experience was to explore the various leadership styles of the leaders of the Civil War and how each leader's style evidenced itself throughout the Gettysburg campaign.

This morning, we reported to the School of Strategic Leadership for a presentation by Major General William E. Rapp, Commandant of the USAWC, just before attending the After Action Review, allowing for introspective identification of our respective leadership styles. We ended this unique executive experience with internal reflections led by Dr. Bob Thompson and the closing comments and presentations by Colonel Petery.

We are currently awaiting our return flight to Houston after an amazing, informative, and unique opportunity to not only learn about some of the greatest historical leaders within the nation's military, but also how we can apply some of those strategies to forward excellence in education. I look forward to reporting further on this professional development opportunity upon my return.

#### **Conference Equips Professionals, Parents, Caregivers of Children** with Challenging Behaviors, Mental Issues



Helping children with challenging behaviors is the focus of the Healthy Minds Healthy Families Conference scheduled for May 6 from 9a.m.-4:30 p.m. at Harris County Department of Education, 6300 Irvington. Cost of the workshop held through HCDE Head Start is only \$10 and includes lunch and free parking through a grant-funded initiative from the Hogg Foundation.

Training sessions with health professionals and others who work with children with mental health issues cover subjects ranging from growing up with bipolar disorder, ADHD, transforming the challenging child, food choices and mental health, and suicide prevention for children and teens. Additional topics include yoga for kids, understanding behaviors of abused children, keeping children with special needs safe, managing meltdowns, domestic violence 101, and positive guidance and discipline. Continuing education credits are available upon completion of the conference.

The Hogg Foundation advances recovery and wellness in Texas by funding mental health services, policy analysis, research, and public education. Sponsors for the conference include United Healthcare and Legacy and Community Health.

"We hope that teachers, parents, caretakers, early childhood educators, and members of the Head Start community take advantage of the quality workshops being offered through our conference," said Venetia Peacock, senior director of Harris County Department of Education's Head Start division.

#### 'Learn to Earn' Graduates at HCDE Gain Certification, Training, Employability for Oil and Gas Industry

When jobs in the oil and gas industry began disappearing this year, Lashae Johnson knew she had to gain more workforce skills. She found her opportunity in the craft instruction class in the Adult Education division at Harris County Department of Education.

At 40, Johnson had seven years of varied experience when she was laid off. She moved to Houston from Louisiana so she has no family here to lean on. Although she has experience, she needed the basic certification required in the industry, the National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER) and Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) 10.

Johnson joins a growing number of women looking at the oil and gas industry as a new frontier. Pipefitting, industrial maintenance, and welding are a few professions which remain in industry high demand.

Baby boomers are leaving the industry for retirement and taking their expertise with them.

The gap creates opportunity for younger workers like Johnson; however, bosses are looking for forward-thinkers, not workers pegged for just one job.

"It used to be who you know, and now it's what you know," Johnson said. "Refinery companies are looking for people willing to take on opportunities, but they need you to know the basics."

Johnson coupled her on-the-job training with a basic core class at HCDE which combines basic safety, construction math, introduction to hand tools, power tools, construction drawing, materials handling, employability skills, and communication skills. Fifty percent of the time was spent with a craft instructor while the rest was spent with an academic instructor.

HCDE craft instructor Clifton Hypolite says construction drawing was the hardest subject for his 48 students, but most picked up the concepts quickly. A math tutor provided help for those who needed it. The power tools instruction was a little unnerving, but along with experience came empowerment.

April 6 was graduation day. On hand to pass out NCCER certificates was Nolan Davis, career navigator at Capital IDEA, a nonprofit which partners with HCDE to get students trained for employment and helps them get paid while learning a trade.

Along with gaining her certificate and her experience, Johnson has applied for a part-time job teaching the craft instruction class with HCDE. She will also continue with her training, learning more crafts to help her get ahead in the oil and gas industry.

"With the downturn, it gave me a humbling experience because I was used to making good money," she said. "When it stopped, I had to rebrand myself to be competitive and attractive to employers.

The 48 graduates in the NCCER/OSHA core curriculum class are either continuing their training at San Jacinto College in welding or industrial training, or starting ground-level jobs in the oil and gas industry.

"The more you know, the quicker you advance," said Johnson, giving sage advice to her classmates. "We have to broaden our horizons—period."
