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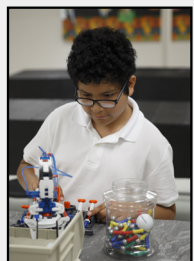
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OF NOTE

As I mentioned in previous issues of **The Connector**, this week I attended a professional development retreat, The Wilderness Experience, as part of my responsibility to the current class of the American Leadership Forum. I will return to Houston tonight. I look forward to providing you a summary of this unique professional growth opportunity in the next issue of **The Connector**.

This week in the area of advancing teaching and learning, we hosted trainings for Harris County educators including Part I of an Online Instructor's Training, a Career Choice Recruitment Seminar, the 11th Annual You Gotta Have Art Workshop, and a Charter School Roundtable. I am pleased to report that we also hosted the Science Teachers and Industry Workshop this week—a several-day workshop where more than 40 middle and high school science teachers were in attendance. The event, which took place Monday through today, was sponsored by the Texas Chemical Council and a host of chemical companies. It featured industry speakers who addressed the chemical industry's concern for the environment as well as the industry's impact on the environment. The event was very well-attended and garnered great visibility for HCDE. It allowed the Department to continue to partner with various entities within the community. Also, in partnership with the community, Crime Stoppers and HCDE will host the 2016 School Safety Summit on August 3, 2016 from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. at the Irvington location. This event will convene school administrators and school-based law enforcement officers to discuss those issues facing campuses during the upcoming school year.

All members of the HCDE Board of Trustees are invited to attend. This serves as a great opportunity to recognize and motivate staff.

Please be reminded that the July Board Meeting will be held on Tuesday, July 26, 2016 at 1:00 p.m. During the meeting, we will recognize three area journalists. The journalists will be honored by HCDE through the TASB-sponsored Statewide Media Honor Roll. Three Houston Journalists Honored by HCDE through Statewide Media Honor Roll 2016



Three Houston journalists are honored by Harris County Department of Education through the Texas Association of School Boards Media Honor Roll 2016 on July 26 at 1 p.m. at the HCDE board meeting, 6300 Irvington Blvd. The recognized communicators are Lauren Talarico, reporter and fill-in anchor for KHOU-TV Channel 11, Jessica Rivera, managing assignments editor for KXLN-TV Univision 45 and Sylvia Oben, multimedia journalist for Semana News.

The journalists are being honored for their contributions to public education with fair, accurate and balanced reporting.

"These journalists abide by their public duty to report bad news, but they also supply good news by sharing the success stories of our students, teachers and educational services," said James Colbert, Jr., superintendent at HCDE. "By honoring them, we are showing our appreciation for their support of public education in Harris County."

Talarico reported about HCDE's school for students with intellectual or behavioral disabilities. HCDE serves area school districts that have children with severe emotional and special physical needs through its Academic and Behavior Schools, schools with low student to teacher ratios and individualized student learning plans.

Rivera assigned several news stories related to HCDE's Adult Education program and its teacher alternative certification program. The stories helped with recruitment of students and teachers.

Rivera and Talarico also both served on a media panel for the Houston Area School Public Relations Association, an event that supports networking between school district communications and local media.

Oben provided vital information to the public about bullying through HCDE's Center for Safe and Secure Schools and also helped with student recruitment for Adult Education through a GED graduation story. Both stories were delivered through print, and online through video.

The three journalists will receive plaques and accolades through a video presentation at Tuesday's meeting of the HCDE Board.

Science Teachers and Industry Workshop at HCDE Helps Educators, Students Understand Local Industry through Hands-On Training

Teachers throughout Harris County gained a better understanding of the chemical manufacturing industry and area chemical plants through a summer workshop from July 18-22 hosted by Harris County Department of Education and sponsored by the Texas Chemical Council and a host of companies. In turn, area middle and high schools benefited by learning how science applies to the workplace.

Included in the workshop were tours of chemical plants, an overview of the Houston Ship Channel, and a consumer product bucket assembly of products produced by companies in the Houston area such as Ziploc baggies, Gorilla Gel, masking tape, Ivory soap, and baby diapers. Educators take those buckets back into their classrooms to show students tangible items produced by industry.

Academic science specialists and industry experts presented a full scope of environmental viewpoints during the four-day workshop. The workshop ended with company representatives explaining about careers in the industry, and educational requirements to qualify for the jobs.

Monty Heins, Dow Chemical Company employee and chairman of the East Harris County Manufacturers Association, represents about 90 companies in the association which collaboratively reach out in the community to recruit new workers. His overview of the Houston Ship Channel at the workshop helps equip the teachers with knowledge about professional opportunities for their students.

"We offer a spectrum of jobs in our industry but our workforce is our future," he said. "It's an important piece of what our organization does."

Karen Nickel, Pearland High School chemistry teacher, said the knowledge she gains to help students get to know the local chemical industry helps her get across the concept of how many jobs rely on chemistry knowledge in the Gulf Coast.

Paul Tagliabue, Humble ISD Creekwood Middle School science teacher, said it's every science teacher's challenge to make real-world connections.

"This workshop is so relevant to our kids—this is our challenge—to make things relevant," he said.

Baytown Nature Center teacher and naturalist Christina Butcher conducts field trips at the nature center with Goose Creek Consolidated students. She believes in the balance between nature and industry. Neighboring company Exxon Mobil is funding nature center field trips for preschoolers at the center. Chevron funds a summer science camp in the wetlands refuge.

HCDE science curriculum director Lisa Felske coordinates the workshop each year. She believes it's important for teachers to meet industry professionals so that they can explain chemical industry processes to their students.

"Teachers get an overview of the cycling of plastics—from raw materials to manufactured products to plastic recycling," she said. "They meet chemical engineers, plant managers and other industry professionals as they go on tours and take in the seminars."

Teachers take the information back into the classroom and are empowered with first-person background information for their students, including details about everyday products that consumers use related to the chemical industry.

Roberta Scott Joins HCDE's Center for Safe and Secure Schools as School Safety Solutions Specialist

Harris County Department of Education's Center for Safe and Secure Schools has appointed Roberta Scott to a new position as safety solutions specialist. The center was formed in 1999 by HCDE at the request of local superintendents to provide increased safety and security strategies in school environments for students and educators.

Scott's tenured experience in education will enhance the center's ability to serve area school districts with increased safety and security strategies, said Center for Safe and Secure Schools Director Ecomet Burley.

Her diverse résumé reflects many areas of expertise, including more than 10 years of experience enhancing educational standards for schools. She worked for Baltimore County Public Schools as counselor coordinator and also served students in Houston Independent School District as academic program manager for Apollo 20, an initiative created six years ago to increase academic performance and close the achievement gap.

Originally from Beaumont, Scott has lived in the Houston area for 24 years. She earned a doctorate in educational leadership and a master's degree in counseling education from Prairie View A&M University and a bachelor's degree in speech communication from Texas Southern University.

"Roberta Scott is a smart, dedicated professional whose vast experience in education will be a huge asset to the center as she brings knowledge and enthusiasm to her new role," said Burley. "Her ability to put in place long-term strategies to improve the lives of students will help us continue to increase safety and security in area schools, which now more than ever is extremely important."

Scott, also a parent of a school-aged daughter, emphasized the critical and timely nature of her role, which among other things involves conducting safety audits to ensure that schools are prepared for the unexpected.

"As educators, it's so important that we do not forget our responsibility to protect and nurture the stars of our future, our students," she said.
