It was a successful week at HCDE! First off, thank you for your attendance at this week's Board Meeting this past Tuesday. It was a productive meeting and again, I thank you for your service to HCDE. Furthermore, our campus principals were honored to be publicly recognized by you for their service in observance of Principals' Month, as declared by Governor Greg Abbott.

On Monday of this week, I met with the Executive Leadership Team (ELT). I continue to keep my finger on the pulses of all of our programs, service offerings, and divisions—especially through this ongoing medium. In the Education and Enrichment arena, we hosted internationally-acclaimed presenter Eric Jensen this week. Dr. Jensen is a brain research expert and author. We had a successful discussion and exchange of ideas related to how our respective organizations impact education across Harris County, and the public education community-at-large. I look forward to continuing to nurture this relationship moving forward.

Finally, have a relaxing weekend and I hope you enjoy this issue of **The Connector**. You are appreciated.



Choice Partners Hosts Food Expo



With clipboards in hand, about 150 students sampled the food from about 60 vendors alongside their school district nutrition directors and complete a survey. Choice Partners gathers that information to decide on future food contracts with vendors who are awarded contracts for groceries, dairy products, bread, produce and other food products. The legal, competitively awarded contracts save member school districts both time and money in purchasing school lunches.

Food is purchased annually by school districts in greater Harris County for more than 85 million student lunches through the contracts available through Harris County Department of Education's Choice Partners.

Rich Chicks: Whole muscle, whole-grain, fully cooked sliders made from the "filet mignon" cut of the chicken. (Houston ISD goes through 7,680 pounds of these filets per day.)

Breakfast Fundles: Individually wrapped, stuffed sandwiches which feature two fun shapes and popular flavors that are great for breakfast or lunch.

Some other featured items include breakfast sausage pizza with country gravy, whole-grain pizza, whole-grain apple cinnamon muffins, reduced-sugar ice cream and a multiple of fresh fruit options.

Lights On Afterschool! Morning Celebration Planned at City Hall October 22 through Alliance of Local Afterschool Organizations

The Lights On Afterschool! rally and press conference on October 22 at 10 a.m. at the Houston City Hall Rotunda, 900 Bagby, celebrates the importance of afterschool programs and the achievements of students participating in out-of-school time programs. It also draws attention to the need for more afterschool programs in greater Harris County.

Sponsored by members of the Greater Houston Lights On Alliance, the event includes afterschool support remarks by Houston City Council members and the unveiling of new afterschool research. Cheerleaders lead the rally in support of afterschool.

In Texas, 935,057 kids are on their own during the hours after school, or 19 percent. An analysis of 68 afterschool studies found that participants in high-quality afterschool programs go to school more, behave better, receive better grades, and perform better on tests.

Throughout greater Houston, communities will celebrate afterschool at programs in schools, community centers, and faith-based organizations on October 22 from 4-7 p.m.



Organizations that are a part of the greater Houston Lights On Alliance include the Center for Afterschool, Summer and Expanded Learning, or CASE for Kids, a division of Harris County Department of Education; Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Houston; the YMCA; Houston Independent School District; the South East Texas After-School Association; the Education Foundation of Harris County; and the Houston Parks & Recreation Department.

"We want the community to know the benefits of afterschool, especially during a time when funding for programs is waning throughout the nation," said Lisa Thompson-Caruthers, director for CASE for Kids.

Houston is benefitting this year from funding for afterschool projects through City Connections, an initiative supported by Houston City Council and administered by CASE for Kids, which infuses all 11 city council districts with \$45,000 throughout the school year.

"We continue to look for innovative ways to support afterschool in greater Houston and celebrate the innovative programs we have here," Thompson-Caruthers said.

CASE for Kids provides resources, trainings and funding for students in grades pre-k through 12 in afterschool programs in schools, child care facilities and community centers.
