Harris County Department of Education CASE for Kids Coordinator Adrian Fields Earns National Afterschool Leader Award



The Center for Afterschool, Summer and Enrichment for Kids employee Adrian Fields, 29, is officially a force to be reckoned with in the field of afterschool. Fields was selected for the "AfterSchool's Next Generation of Afterschool 2017," awarded by the National Afterschool

Association. He was selected from a field of 100 young afterschool leaders under age 30 throughout the nation.

Fields has worked for CASE for Kids as project coordinator of strategic partnerships for a year and a half. The University of North Texas grad taught in South Korea post-college and also worked as a Peace Corps volunteer in West Africa.

In his position, he creates and promotes partnerships with public and private agencies to support afterschool programming. The partnerships he shapes in afterschool include schools, churches and community centers in Harris County.

His strong background in project management and community development is recognized through the National Afterschool Association award. As a skilled organizer, he creates opportunities for youth.

"I decided to work in afterschool because I feel it's the best way to address gaps in youth development, decrease risky behaviors of students and provide students with more diverse learning opportunities," he said. He remembers afterschool as a youth and the opportunity it afforded to play music. As the "orc dork," slang for orchestra members, he played cello. Doing so, he says, helped him foster skills in self-expression and sharpen his concentration abilities.

"Through my afterschool program, I learned the importance of working in a team and developed organizational and time management skills as well," he said.

Watching kids write code for websites, program through robotics and master musical pieces through their afterschool experiences showcases the value and need for afterschool, he said.

"Most of these students would not be exposed to these experiences without the work of CASE for Kids," Fields said.

His own life experiences have helped set the stage for carrying out his career goals. Someday Fields hopes to run a nonprofit consulting agency that guides local and international non-governmental organizations on effective business strategies and sustainable practices.

Behind that dream is an adolescent who once struggled to squeak out a tune on a cello in afterschool but today is confidently mastering the song.

(As an afterschool intermediary, CASE for Kids provides resources, trainings and funding for students in grades pre-k through 12 in afterschool programs in schools, child care facilities and community centers. As a branch of Harris County Department of Education, the division was founded in 1999 with a goal to keep kids safe, help working families and improve academic achievement.)

GIS Student Day Set for November 17 at HCDE Helps Promote STEM Activities in Schools



Students from five area high schools are learning about career opportunities in geographic information systems, or GIS, through hands-on activities during Houston Area GIS Students Day on November 17 from 9 a.m.-2 p.m. at Harris County Department of Education, 6300 Irvington, Houston, Texas.

The students from DeKaney, Silsbee, Spring, Waltrip and Westfield high schools will be working in a GIS lab, geocaching with emergency vehicles, participating in a geography bee and learning about careers with GIS.

GIS is used in industries including engineering, transportation, telecommunications and business. GIS systems are used to capture, store, analyze and manage geographical data. For instance, GIS is used to map infrastructure and transportation.

The student day, a 15-year tradition, is sponsored by Harris County Department of Education, the Houston-Galveston Area Council Geographic Data Workgroup and TranStar. A student essay contest is also part of the annual event.

Last year a group of students from Houston Independent School District presented a project applying GIS mapping to track sex offenders within proximity to schools. Their information was fed to law enforcement.

"Applying GIS mapping to projects helps students attach the science to real-life situations and allows them to ponder career paths using GIS," said Lisa Felske, HCDE science curriculum director.

Hosting the GIS Students Day is part of a long-term initiative to support science, technology, engineering and mathematics, or STEM activities in public schools, said Frances Watson-Hester, senior director of the Teaching and Learning Center at HCDE.

Houston ISD Autism Students Engage, Interact with Therapy Dogs



HCDE Therapy Services employee Angelle Radesky recently organized a hands-on learning experience for Houston ISD high school students with autism who have limited

communication skills. The experience was provided by therapy dogs and their handlers from The Bright and Beautiful Therapy Dogs of Houston, Inc., a non-profit organization. The students prepared for the visit by watching videos and a presentation that included information about therapy dogs and instructions on how to approach owners and their dogs safely.

One student's mother remarked that her son had never interacted with a dog before. During the visit, he not only petted the dogs, he took the largest of the dogs for a walk around the classroom! The teacher was pleased to see another of her students get out of her chair to approach a dog, smile, and engage with the dogs. For this particular student it was both unusual and very special.



The teacher felt the experience helped the students overcome their fears and make connections with new people, their peers, and the dogs.
