Time for Toys: A Time for Giving Back for Adult Learners at HCDE

A holiday toy campaign called “Time for Toys” launched by Harris County Department of Education employees grew into a community giving campaign for adult education students attending classes through the department. The students are learning English, working on academics to pass their GEDs and gaining workplace skills. They’re also getting life lessons about being model citizens by giving back through the toy drive.

Hilda Ramos, program assistant for HCDE Adult Education promoted the toy campaign originally organized by HCDE Human Resources to her teachers and students enrolled in night classes. The notion of giving toys to needy Head Start children grew like wildfire.

Once tallied, the students enrolled in four GED and English as a second language evening classes collected

300 cars, dolls, puzzles, books, stuffed animals and other items for 3- to 5-year-olds.

“Most of our students are working students, trying to improve their lives to get better jobs,” said Ramos.

“They want to be better citizens in the community and to be role models for their children.”

HCDE County School Superintendent James Colbert said he is humbled by the generosity of the adult learners, the teachers and staff.

“Many of our students struggle financially, yet they find the resources to give back,” Colbert said.

Student Salvador Cardenas, 45, a student enrolled in Monica Hampton’s ESL class, remembers a time when he was 12 and received a toy truck when his family needed help at Christmas.

“I now have the opportunity to share something with kids in need,” said the father of three. “People helped me when I was a kid, and I was happy because of it.”

A pizza party was organized by Ramos for the top two winning classes. Although the incentive of food helped, ESL teacher Lucinda Guevara says her students participated because the campaign is about feeling good about giving. She recently took her students to the Houston Food Bank to volunteer to reinforce good citizenship.

“It’s the attitude of helping people out there,” Guevara said. “I have been enjoying it, and my students enjoy it too.”

Head Start Policy Council Combines Business with Holiday Celebration



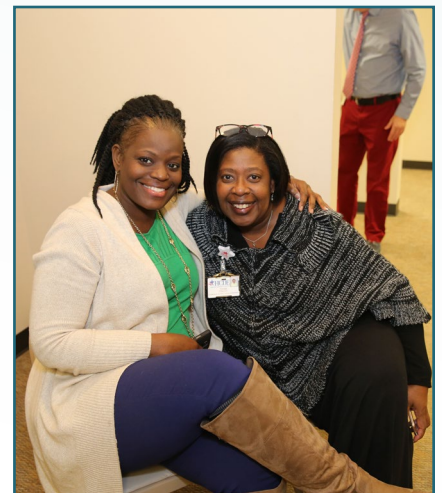

Head Start mothers Ashley Henderson and Selina Elias were selected for the Responsible Parenting Award based on criteria like dedication to their children’s education and self-improvement, said Venetia Peacock, senior HCDE Head Start director.

Leila Bates, vice president of Bates Collision Centers, said the staff presents cars number 31 and 32 this year, and they have no plans to slow down.

“It’s an 18-year-old Christmas tradition that gets all our staff involved in the spirit of giving,” Bates said. “It can change a life, and it has changed our lives. Seeing the joy on the faces of the receiving family, especially the children when they see the car chock-full of beautifully wrapped gifts is priceless.”

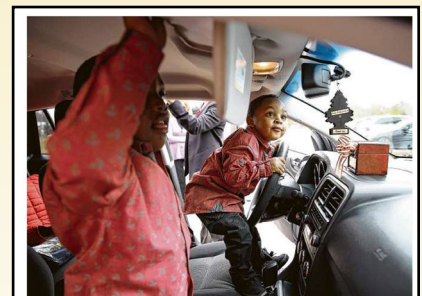
gifting of the cars. Cars are traditionally filled with gifts from Bates Collision, and community members donate gas, insurance and materials needed to rehab the cars.

The 46th Annual Santa Houston CPA Goody Bag Stuffing Campaign is providing 7,600 extra stocking stuffers for children enrolled in Head Start Centers throughout Harris County. The bags filled with apples, books, dental kits and healthy snacks were assembled by an army of volunteers on December 9 from 8:30 -10:30 a.m. At 11:30 a.m., Houston CPA volunteers, plus Santa, visited the HCDE Pugh Head Start Center located at 1042 Henke in northeast Houston to make one of several holiday deliveries to 1,200 HCDE Head Start students.

Partners in the program are the Houston CPA Society, South Texas Dental, ABC Dental, The Ripley House and the U.S. Coast Guard Sector Houston-Galveston. At Harris County Department of Education, 1,200 students benefit from the donations.

The Houston CPA Society has 8,000 members who represent 13 area counties surrounding Houston, according to Jennifer Poff, the organization's executive director. The event is a signature event for the organization.

Head Start programs are federally funded and provide educational services for low-income families of preschool children, including those with disabilities.

HCDE CASE for Kids, Pasadena ISD Afterschool Programs to Host Traditional Tamale-Making Party at South Houston Elementary and Intermediate Schools



Every year at this time, many Latino families gather to celebrate a fragrant tradition: the tamalada, or tamale-making party. These family gatherings serve as social affairs where members of the extended family get together to prepare food, catch up on family news and just enjoy spending time together.

This year, the Center for Afterschool, Summer and Enrichment for Kids (CASE for Kids) Texas ACE 21 Century afterschool programs at South Houston Elementary and South Houston Intermediate host a Tamalada Party on Friday, Dec. 16. The

day's festivities will kick off with the making of tamales from 9 a.m. to noon at South Houston Elementary, 900 Main St. in Houston. Sharing of community resources and games will take place in the afternoon until 4 p.m. and will be followed by a celebration and dinner lasting until 6 p.m.

"This is an innovative way that both schools will be promoting their afterschool programs and their family engagement component to the families and the community," said Lisa Thompson-Caruthers, director for CASE for Kids, a division of Harris County Department of Education.

Rich with Latino culture, these two campuses sit a couple of miles from each other. The elementary feeds into the middle school in Pasadena ISD. Parents are familiar with each other, and some even have children that attend both elementary and intermediate afterschool programs. Like many of the families that benefit from HCDE-CASE for Kids Texas ACE Programs, however, many work and have busy schedules that might keep them from participating on campus.

Parents from both campuses, under the leadership of HCDE CASE for Kids' Family Engagement Specialists, have come together to host their children's first tamalada. Two types of tamales will be made Mexican and Central American Tamales. Families will be sharing recipes and learning from each other's culture.

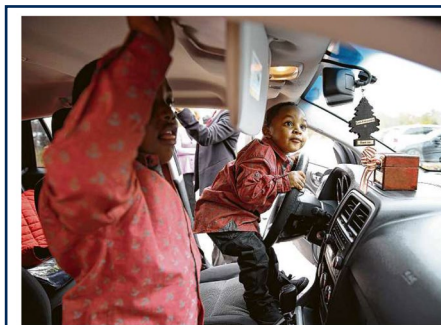


This week, Bates Custom and Collision held its annual car give-away where two deserving Head Start families were gifted with
