HCDE Therapist Charlotte Eccles Competes on NBC's American Ninja Warrior



HCDE School-Based Therapy Services physical therapist Charlotte Eccles competed on American Ninja Warrior, a televised athletic competition that requires contestants to leap, flip, and crawl through a series of obstacles. The episode, which was filmed in San Antonio, aired on KPRC Channel 2 on June 19.

Eccles shared her personal journey on the show. Two and a half years ago, Eccles was diagnosed with a brain tumor condition called acoustic neuroma. Surgery left her with several impairments.

"Six months after surgery, I transitioned from a conventional outpatient physical therapy setting into a ninja gym, with a physical therapist and trainer who happened to be an American Ninja Warrior competitor," Eccles said. "I remember the first day I walked into the ninja gym. All the obstacles that I saw were so parallel with the obstacles in life I was facing. In that moment, I knew it was going to be the place that I took back everything my tumor had stolen physically from me."

During Monday night's episode, Eccles handily overcame the first obstacle but was eliminated during the "Tic Toc" challenge, a difficult obstacle designed to resemble the pendulum of a clock. Many contestants, including veteran competitors, fell into the water and were eliminated during this challenge.

Through her position as a physical therapist in School-Based Therapy Services, Eccles works with children with special needs in Spring Branch Independent School District in their school environment. Physical therapy in the school setting may help children with challenges that include: getting on and off the bus, adapting physical education activities, maneuvering through the cafeteria line, and supporting mobility and positioning options to help students be successful in the classroom and school environment.

CASE for Kids Students Explore Local Colleges, Career Options via METRORail



Students from a dozen schools participated in the "Amazing Race College and Career Exploration" on June 15 to explore local colleges and apply

their problem-solving and teamwork skills. The event was sponsored by HCDE's CASE for Kids and the University of Houston-Downtown and supported by Houston Community College, Texas Southern University, and University of Houston-Central.

The students who are enrolled in CASE for Kids summer programs through the Texas Education Agency's Afterschool Centers on Education's 21st Century Learning Center gained valuable information about college through interactive tours on the METRORail System.

The Texas ACE program, which is implemented locally through CASE for Kids, works to promote workforce awareness and college readiness as one of its four core components. CASE for Kids provides afterschool support services, including grant funding, training, and materials which supports over 11,000 children in greater Harris County.

"This interactive field trip initiates a unique learning experience as it introduces students to colleges and

universities as means to encourage the pursuit of higher education," said Lisa Thompson-Caruthers, director of CASF for Kids.

After touring the three colleges and uncovering clues at each college destination, students returned to the University of Houston-Downtown for lunch where they heard from former at-risk teen and first generation graduate Elias Santibanez.

Aldine ISD sixth grader Kosha Miles was excited to participate in the Amazing Race event and ride the METRORail to collect clues with her team from Marcella Intermediate School.

"I heard about the event and wanted to learn more about local colleges and career options for my future," said Miles. "I also really enjoyed learning



to use the METRORail and get experience traveling downtown."

Certified Nursing Assistant Graduates Celebrated

About 75 adult learners were celebrated as HCDE's certified nursing assistant graduates attended a ceremony in June recognizing their accomplishments in gaining information and experience needed to become a nurse assistant.

The 10-week program provides academics and hands-on training so that nurse assistants may care for clients in long-term care facilities, hospitals, home health care, and hospice settings.

To be eligible for the program, adult learners must be at an intermediate level in reading, math, and language classes and be eligible to work in the United States. HCDE offers the classes in several geographic areas of Houston.

Certified nursing assistants earn approximately \$9.50 to \$11 an hour.

The state's competency test evaluates nurse aide-related knowledge, skills, and abilities. As a student successfully completes the HCDE Adult Education class, they are eligible to take the state test to become a certified nurse assistant. The course prepares students to seek employment in various health care settings, including skilled nursing facilities, hospice care, retirement facilities, rehab hospitals, and day care facilities for the elderly.
