Presenters discussed how grassroots advocacy can be a powerful force in shaping educational policy. Partnership Project Funding through Harris County Department of Education's CASE for Kids Provides \$550,787 to Fund Area 24 Programs

Afterschool is made possible for 600 children across Harris County for the upcoming 2017-2018 school year through \$550,787 in funding to Harris County Department of Education's Center for Afterschool, Summer and Enrichment for Kids, or CASE for Kids. The CASE for Kids Partnership Project is the result of collaboration between HCDE, the Houston-Galveston Area Council, the Texas Workforce Commission, and awarded sites. HCDE commits local funds to supplement comprehensive afterschool programming.

CASE for Kids provides resources, trainings, and funding for afterschool programs, serving students in grades pre-k through 12 in afterschool programs in schools, child care facilities, and community centers throughout Harris County. Specifically, Partnership Project funding begins as school opens in August and extends through summer. Amounts vary from \$10,000 to \$30,000 for each program.

The following districts and sites gain the funding: Aldine ISD (Goodman Elementary, Raymond Academy and Stehlik Intermediate); Academy of Accelerated Learning (charter); Alief ISD (Kennedy Elementary and Miller Intermediate); Boys and Girls Clubs of Greater Houston (Havard, Morefield and Stafford); Houston ISD (Benbrook, Briscoe, Field, Park Place, Port Houston, Sequin, Whidby and Whittier elementary schools); Pasadena ISD (Frazier Elementary and Connections at Teague), Precinct2gether, Inc. (YET II); Sheldon ISD (Carroll, Monahan and Sheldon elementary schools); and Southwest Schools Charter (Bissonnet Elementary).

The goal of Partnership Project is to provide supplemental funding for comprehensive afterschool programs in order to promote several areas of learning. Funding provides increased support for numeracy, literacy, and social and emotional learning, explained Lisa Thompson-Caruthers, director of CASE for Kids.

"At Harris County Department of Education, we remain committed to supporting afterschool as a means to keep kids safe and provide enriching activities before and after school and during summer months," said HCDE County School Superintendent James Colbert Jr. "Partnership Projects is a cornerstone for meeting that goal."

"It is truly an honor to be selected as a member of the Affiliate Advisory Council," said Segraves. "The Scholastic Art & Writing Awards change the lives of students across the nation, and I'm proud to have the opportunity to be more involved in these efforts."

Center for Safe and Secure Schools Trains Districts on Incident Management



To help make sure area schools are ready to respond to incidents in an organized and effective manner, HCDE's Center for Safe and Secure Schools provided National Incident

Management System (NIMS) training on Tuesday, June 27. This emergency management training, which includes an introduction to the Incident Command System and the National Response Framework, is the first of three workshops that HCDE provides at a discount to Harris County districts. "This training is essential for central office personnel and other key staff members," said Ecomet Burley, director, Center for Safe and Secure Schools. "We're making use of the



summer months to provide training, assessment and certification all on the same day."

The next NIMS training, ICS-300, which covers expanding incidents, will be held July 11 at HCDE.



EDUCATION AND ENRICHMENT BRIEFS

Center for Safe and Secure Schools

The Center for Safe and Secure Schools presented an "Overview of Restorative Discipline Practices" at two different conferences. The staff presented to 1,500 school leaders at HISD's Professional Learning Series, in line with the annual PLS theme, "Support Every Child: Create a Culture and Climate for all Students." The staff also visited San Antonio to present to school board members and personnel at the Summer Leadership Institute, Texas Association of School Boards' annual training conference.

Educator Certification and Professional Advancement

The School Reform Initiative had its second annual Pre-Service Retreat, hosting educators from Colorado, Georgia, Indiana, Massachusetts and Texas. ECPA Grants Development Manager Jonett Miniel organized the Pre-Service Workgroup six years ago to convene educators working with aspiring teachers. This year the group gathered at Eagle Rock School and Professional Development Center in Estes Park, Colorado to plan the next five months using improvement sciences. They will reconnect monthly and present their results at the initiative's November meeting in Atlanta.

ECPA's Principal Preparation and Certification Academy hosted a four-day seminar series on cultivating cultural intelligence in aspiring leaders. The series is part of ECPA Leadership Advancement Officer Dr. Deirdre Williams' and Prairie View A&M's Dr. Kelly Brown's research on the necessary goals of professional development.

Adult Education

Adult Education staff attended the Texas Workforce Commission's Adult Education and Literacy Summer Institute in Austin to learn about key financial and performance changes. Changes included increased flexibility for demonstrating student progress and new employment performance measures for next year.
