A little boy named Nathan made a big impression this week as longtime community partner Bates Collision Centers gave away its 34th car to a deserving parent. Joined by Trustees Michael Wolfe and Erica Lee Carter, I witnessed the pure joy of the Zuniga family receiving a refurbished vehicle to replace one lost during Hurricane Harvey. But the media crews quickly figured out who the real star was – 4-year-old Nathan, who raced his new bicycle all over the parking lot at the Bates facility in Channelview.

This year's giveaway ceremony was bittersweet as Bates Collision Centers was burglarized the night before, leaving Bates employees and their community partners scrambling to replace the wrapped gifts stolen from the facility. Thankfully, the vehicle was relatively unscathed and the celebration went on as planned. I commend the Bates family for their steadfast commitment to supporting responsible parenting and early education.

One of our own employees from Head Start was the other recipient of a vehicle at the Bates facility in Baytown. Bahiyyah Rashed had been sharing a vehicle with her mother while juggling her teaching job with caring for her two young sons and a niece.

The week began with 28 adult learners being inducted into the National Adult Honor Society, an accolade that will advance their future employment and educational

opportunities. We heard from the director of our Adult Education division, Dr. Eduardo Honold, at our regular meeting of the Board of Trustees on Wednesday. HCDE Grants Division Receives Award from Bank of Texas



The HCDE Center for Grants Development recently received preliminary notification of a \$7,020 grant award from Bank of Texas for Head Start's Read Excel Achieve Lead (REAL) SuperMENtors Read program. REAL SuperMENtors Read promotes literacy and encourages a love for reading. The grant will provide funds to purchase Scholastic book sets for 195 students.

Two Bank of Texas employees currently volunteer as SuperMENtors and visit Head Start classrooms once a month to read a book aloud to the students.

Harris County Scholastic Art & Writing Entries Climb as Regional Competition Kicks Off

Sixty art professionals arrive this week to judge the individual entries and portfolios. About 2,200 writing entries were received. Those will be judged online with 120 writing professionals in the next month.

Winners in the regional Awards will be announced in January through email.

Harvey-Impacted Families Receive Gift of Transportation from Longtime HCDE Supporter Bates Collision Centers

Awards from longtime supporter Bates Collision Centers on Dec. 12 and 14. After losing their vehicles during Hurricane Harvey and enduring months of transportation challenges, Rashed and Zuniga were overwhelmed when receiving their rehabbed cars at the Bates Collision Baytown and Channelview locations.

The giveaway ceremony on Dec. 14 in Channelview looked different this year as Bates Collision Centers was burglarized the night before.



While the rehabbed vehicle was unharmed, the wrapped gifts for the family were stolen from the facility. Owners Lee and Leila Bates, their employees and community partners came together and acted quickly to replace the gifts in time for the ceremony.

This year, more than 30 businesses in the Baytown and Channelview areas contributed to the annual car giveaways. Bates employees donated time to work on the cars and helped fill them with gifts, and other community members and businesses donated gas, insurance and materials needed the rehab the cars.



The Bates Collision and Head Start staff were joined at the giveaway ceremonies by members of the community, local businesses, elected officials, HCDE Superintendent James Colbert, Jr. and members of the HCDE Board of Trustees.

"These cars demonstrate true community support and bring normalcy and independence back to these families," said HCDE Trustee Erica Lee Carter.

In its 19th year, HCDE Head Start's partnership with Bates Collision Centers gifted cars No. 33 and 34 to the two moms. Recipients of the Responsible Parenting Awards are chosen based on need, dedication to their child's education and commitment to becoming self-sufficient.



"I've attended this event a number of times, and every year it's great to see these parents' lives significantly improved by the gift of a car," said HCDE Trustee Michael Wolfe.

Superintendent Colbert believes the partnership between HCDE Head Start and Bates Collision Centers is particularly important this year as much of the county faces transportation issues post-Harvey.

"Hurricane Harvey has dramatically changed what some people's holiday looks like this year," said Colbert. "It's touching and impactful that, through our partnership with Bates, we're able to give cars back to families that lost them."

Bates Collision Centers provides two rehabbed cars each year to our Head Start moms in need of transportation. This year, Hurricane Harvey created a greater need for vehicles, and Lee and Leila Bates and their Baytown and Channelview communities made two families very happy.

As we enter into our 19th year of partnering with Bates, we realize how important these strong community ties really area.

Car 33 was first delivered to mom and Head Start employee Bahiyyah Rashed, a single mother of two boys who most recently adopted her niece to make it a family of four. Rashed works very hard to be a role model for her children and teaches them each day that actions have consequences. Mother Vanessa Zuniga received car number 34, and she volunteers at Pugh with son Nathan but must often wait for extended periods for transportation to work, his school and community commitments.

Coordinating these two events takes countless hours and commitment. I publicly thank the Bates, their staff and community for continuing to value our partnership. Also, we are grateful for our own Head Start employees who help "fuel" this partnership.

I could not encapsulate the whole experience any better than the Bates did this



year on their annual postcard invite:
