HCDE Adult Education Begins Initiative for Tyson Chicken Employees through Texas Workforce Commission



Adult Education is the first adult education program in the state to work in collaboration with workforce partner Tyson Chicken to educate English language learners through an initiative called "Upward Academy," a statewide initiative with Tyson sponsored by the Texas Workforce Commission. The classes provide English as a language instruction for

contextual language for the workplace, as well as general ESL beginner classes. HCDE Adult Education will train about 150 students at the Houston Tyson plant.

In other Adult Education news, the division received \$9,000 as a donation through the Spring Branch Family Development Center earmarked to provide afternoon classes at the center. HCDE Adult Education already provides classes in the mornings and evenings. An additional 400 adults will be served.

CASE for Kids Gains 2017 Best After School Program Award from National Teen Truth



The Center for Afterschool, Summer and Enrichment for Kids, or CASE for Kids, has earned the "2017 Best After School Program Award" from Teen Truth, a youth empowerment program, for its partnership in a socialemotional learning program for teens called "Rising Up." The award is one of several announced by national presenter and Teen Truth founder J.C. Pohl in January 2018.

'Tackling A-F: Equity for All' set for Feb. 9 at HCDE to Feature National Presenters Cleveland, Mercado



"Tackling A-F: Equity for All" addresses diversity in the classroom and the strategies which can be used to bridge learning styles and culture. The workshop set for Feb. 9, 2018 from 8 a.m.-3:30 p.m. at Harris County Department of

Education, 6300 Irvington, features national speakers Roger Cleveland and Rosalinda Mercado. The Neuhaus Center for Education also provides a presentation on dyslexia.

Cleveland is known as a moderator and presenter at over 45 conferences. He is called upon for his work in diversity, instructional equity, cultural competency, closing achievement gaps, learning styles, transforming school culture and school improvement planning. His presentation is titled: "The Road to Proficiency is Not a One-Way Street: Equity for All."

Mercado is an expert in social-emotional awareness, the competencies which humans need to understand the emotions of others, including empathy, organizational awareness and service orientation. Her presentation called "The 8 Essentials of High-Performing Teams with Self and Team Awareness" calls for a heightened self-awareness and awareness of others.

Additional speakers will provide breakout sessions on topics such as dyslexia, English language learner technology, independent reading/writing, students with limited education, restorative justice, and special education issues. Presenters include Carol Salva, Seidlitz Education; Krystal Gokey, licensed specialist in school psychology; Uyen Nguyen, educational diagnostician; Mary Yarus and Tracy Weeden, Neuhaus Education Center; Marisela Rodriguez; Vivian Pratts; and representatives from the Center for Safe and Secure Schools, HCDE.

In understanding that diversity and inclusion are different, the institute's objectives are to applaud diversity, support culturally responsive leadership, leverage difference, be reflective, provide researched best practices in teaching, open opportunity doors, and close gaps for all students.

Twenty-one school districts, two charter schools and 16 private schools are represented as students earn Gold Key, Silver Key and honorable mention awards. Gold Key recipients advance to national judging to be considered for Gold and Silver Medals which are announced in March and awarded in June through a ceremony at Carnegie Hall in New York City.

The Scholastic Art & Writing Awards, founded in 1923, provides young artists and writers in grades 7-12 with the opportunity to showcase their work as it identifies and documents their outstanding achievements. The competition's mission is to bring outstanding visual art and writing created by teens to a national audience by showcasing the work and encouraging creative and career development.

Students submitted their work through the 531 teachers who support and participate in HCDE's regional competition. Several hundred volunteer art and writing professionals judge the submittals.

HCDE Commended for Superior Online Financial Transparency from Texas Comptroller



Harris County Department of Education has received three commendations from the Texas Comptroller

for its commitment to easy, online access to HCDE financial data. The transparency awards were announced at the HCDE Board of Trustees Public Hearing on Jan. 24 regarding findings of the HCDE Annual Financial Management Report.

The recognitions are part of the Department's ongoing efforts to provide open and honest communication with Harris County taxpayers and other community stakeholders through online, financial transparency processes.

"Our board and administration believe that in order to be good stewards of taxpayer dollars, we must provide an open, unfiltered window into our organization," said Board President Louis Evans. "Financial transparency is just one example of this."

According to a report from the Texas Comptroller Office, HCDE is one of two of the 1,350 "special districts" throughout the state to earn three fiscal "Transparency Stars" commendation awards. finances. Those goals are achieved through HCDE's website on a visually enhanced financial transparency page at www.hcde-texas.org/transparency. The page offers visual and narrative detail on finances, including outstanding debt obligations; spending and revenue information; and accountability and transparency for contracting activities.

The Texas Comptroller's Office launched its program called "Transparency Stars" in March 2016 to recognize cities, counties, school districts and special-purpose districts which make important strides toward greater government transparency. After achieving a base level of transparency, districts can apply to gain accreditation for five additional areas. HCDE achieved all of those applicable transparency categories.

Also Wednesday, Whitley Penn shared the results of the 2016-2017 Annual Financial Audit of HCDE. The department received the highest possible rating of "unmodified opinion" of HCDE's financial statements.
