HCDE Adult Education Presentation at Junior League Luncheon Reveals Successes at Spring Branch Development Center Adult Learner Program

Adult education is one of the high-demand services at the Spring Branch Family Development Center (SBFDC). Since 2001, almost 6,000 adults have been served there with more than five million hours of instruction through a collaboration with Harris County Department of Education Adult Education.

Adult Education's longstanding partnership with Spring Branch Family Development Center was the topic at a Junior League of Houston Luncheon this month as the center asked Adult Education manager May O'Brien to give a history of service to the Spring Branch adult learner community.

"English language ability is directly linked to how quickly immigrants can adapt to mainstream society and achieve success as workers, community members and parents of their school-aged children," O'Brien said. "I believe the success stems from the emphasis on collaboration and the mutual ownership of the program and student advancement."

To complement HCDE's instruction provided by its highly qualified teachers, the SBFDC provides technology resources for online learning, three large classrooms to HCDE along with space to store instruction materials so that teachers see the center as their home base, she said. Center staff support the community learning efforts and see each level of student English language acquisition as a milestone.

Statistically, the support pays off. Seventy percent of adult learners advance one or more grade levels by the time they leave the program, said O'Brien, who has worked within the Spring Branch community as HCDE Adult Education manager for 17 years.

One of those success stories is a student named Rudis Elias who started studying at the center four years ago. With 800 hours of instruction behind him, Elias has advanced from introductory English language learner classes to advanced. This year he obtained his high school equivalency degree and will participate in graduation at Harris County Department of Education this May.

"He is the perfect example of how hard work and opportunity to study English can unlock the goals and dreams of immigrants," said O'Brien.

community volunteers. The event kicked off with a welcome speech from OneStar Foundation Commissioner Mary Grace Landrum and a proclamation from Mayor Sylvester Turner, followed by an appreciation speech from District A Council Member Brenda Stardig. The event ended with a celebratory reception where attendees were able to meet and network.

Landrum is the public representative for OneStar, which is Texas' state service commission which administers \$14.3 million in federal funding per year to Texas AmeriCorps programs.

AmeriCorps VISTA is a national service program designed to alleviate poverty. President John F. Kennedy originated

the idea for VISTA, which was founded as Volunteers in Service to America in 1965 and incorporated into the AmeriCorps network of programs in 1993. AmeriCorps VISTA members work on projects that build



the capacity of their organization. Projects can vary and are not limited to: developing outreach and marketing campaigns, building a social media presence, creating a program database, writing grants, managing a program in its first year, and recruiting volunteers.

Thousands of local leaders nationwide honored AmeriCorps members and Senior Corps volunteers this month by participating in recognition events, issuing official proclamations, and taking to social media in a nationwide show of appreciation. This initiative is led by the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS), the National League of Cities, the National Association of Counties, and Cities of Service.

School occupational therapists and occupational therapy assistants support academic and non-academic outcomes, including social skills, math, reading and writing, behavior management, recess, participation in sports, self-help skills, prevocational/vocational participation, transportation and more. They also provide support to struggling learners who are not yet in special education to get them the help they need to be successful at school.
