Of Note...

This week was a very productive one at HCDE. This past Monday was a student holiday in most Harris County school districts. It was also a student holiday on HCDE campuses.

I began the week visiting the Academic and Behavior School campuses during professional development sessions related to the recent implementation of cameras on special education campuses. While there, I also had an opportunity to observe Principals' Month by recognizing the principals at both campuses through a special presentation. I will recognize the Highpoint campus principals next week with similar recognitions.

On Tuesday, I traveled to McKinney, Texas-near Dallas-to visit the Serenity High School campuses. I spent both Tuesday and Wednesday making site visits to the campuses within the Serenity system. The Serenity schools are recovery high schools for students struggling with substance abuse. I remain on a factfinding mission as it relates to this specialty school environment as I consider proposing to offer this service to the students in Harris County who are also battling addiction issues.

Yesterday, I spent the day fulfilling my American Leadership Forum (ALF) monthly commitment as we reviewed the findings of the most recent Houston Area Survey results during a joint ALF session. The all-day meeting was informative, and obviously replete with valuable information related to the demographics of our city.

Today, I attended the ALF Second Friday Breakfast where the topic was The Next Legislative Session. The speakers were Senator Sylvia Garcia and State Representative Jim Murphy. They presented dialogue as they see the agenda and priorities of the fast-approaching legislative session. The discussion was moderated by Lisa Malosky of Malosky Productions. Also, today, I presented at an AROSC event where I spoke on my vision for students recovering from substance abuse issues in Harris County.

This week, in the area of teaching and learning, we focused on classroom instruction, digital learning, standardized test preparation (especially focused on science), and literacy through the following workshops and training sessions: Logic Models for Program Planning, Monitoring, and Evaluation of Effectiveness, Building Conceptual Understanding in Grades 3 and 4, STAAR Accommodations for your Special Population Students: What Does It Look Like in the Classroom, and STAAR: A Closer Look at Organisms and Environments (science) for Grades 5 and 8, Test Prep Series for TExES Core Subjects EC-6 Exam for both ELAR and all content areas, and TABE, BEST Literacy, and Best Plus. We also delved into Shades of Learning: Culturally Inclusive Afterschool Programming, and we hosted an Educator Certification and Professional Advancement Career Choice Recruitment Seminar as well as the October School Finance Council Meeting.

On Monday, as previously mentioned, I will be visiting the Highpoint Schools to recognize the principals on both campuses. I will also continue my regular meetings with school superintendents within Harris County.

In closing, please be reminded that the regularly scheduled October Board Meeting is next Tuesday, October 18, 2016, at 1:00 p.m. The Policy Committee will meet immediately prior to that meeting at 12:00 noon.

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\$550,000 in City of Houston Funding Benefits Houston Families through CASE for Kids City Connections



Afterschool gets a boost in the city of Houston thanks to \$550,000 in Houston City Council funding earmarked for a collaborative called CASE for Kids City Connections. The partnership with the city of Houston and the Center for Afterschool, Summer and Enrichment for Kids, or CASE for Kids, provides \$45,000

in funding for nonprofit organizations in each of the 11 Houston City Council districts A-K.

CASE for Kids has worked with city council members and the city of Houston for three years as administrator and coordinator of the City Connections program. Last year, an estimated 7,938 children were served through the program.

Funding begins October 31 through March 31 for the organizations selected as afterschool providers. Grant awards range from \$4,000-\$10,000. Several council districts will reissue a request for proposal due by November 7 for additional funding opportunities in Houston City Council Districts A, B, E, and F.

As an afterschool intermediary, CASE for Kids provides resources, trainings, and funding for students in grades pre-k through 12 in afterschool programs in schools, child care facilities, and community centers. As a branch of Harris County Department of Education, the division was founded in 1999 with a goal to keep kids safe, help working families, and improve academic achievement.

"The need for safe and secure places for our Houston children to go before and after school gets more critical each year as families' work demands increase and federal funding for afterschool disappears," said CASE for Kids Director Lisa Thompson-Caruthers. "Houston leadership is in touch with its families and communities and realizes that children need enriching activities and safe havens during out-of-school time. There are a wealth of worthy organizations who are stepping up to provide quality programs."

In addition to organizations providing afterschool activities for youth, the funded organizations may also use grant funding from the city to improve afterschool program quality.

CASE for Kids will provide resources for quality support via afterschool trainings and lend items from its library to the organizations. Curriculum and equipment such as academic materials, sports equipment and literacy kits can be checked out, free of charge.

A total of 105 City Connections applications were received for the 2016-2017 school year. Organizations will provide a variety of activities for youth after school, including fine arts, academic enrichment, college exploration, and fitness classes.

She is married to HISD Press Secretary Jason Spencer, and they have four children who all attend public schools: Grace, Kelly, Joe and James. The couple share a passion for communications and supporting public education, she said. She also actively volunteers in the homeless ministry for a local church.

Joining HCDE is a greater calling, Spencer says, because expectations of students attending public schools in Harris County have never been higher.

"We expect every child, regardless of their background, to graduate prepared to contribute to our community," Spencer said. "HCDE is uniquely positioned to support this important work at every age level. I am honored to have this opportunity to work with a dedicated team led by a superintendent and elected board who are unified in a desire to keep Harris County strong."



Center for Safe and Secure Schools Begins School Safety Audits

The Center for Safe and Secure Schools dispatched auditing teams to Beaumont and Round Rock independent school districts this week. The safety auditing teams will use a state-of-the-art Emergency Response



Information Portal (ERIP) system to audit five areas that assess school safety and security. To date, the Center has been asked to audit 10 school districts during the 2016-2017 school year.

Choice Partners Annual Vendor Exhibit to be held in New Location

Government employees with responsibility for purchasing are invited to attend the Choice Partners cooperative Annual Vendor Exhibit from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., November 4, 2016, at the Norris Conference Center at Houston City Centre. Nearly 80 vendors plan to showcase their products and services to more than 250 people from school districts, colleges, universities, counties, municipalities, nonprofits, and other governmental entities.

Texas purchasing laws are stringent, so many government entities rely on cooperatives such as HCDE's Choice Partners to award contracts that can be shared between governments. Choice Partners processes were validated last year by the



State Auditor's Office after the agency's six-month, comprehensive audit of HCDE. The rigorous assessment confirmed HCDE Choice Partners' position as a standard-bearer in legal compliance.

Special Needs Student Finds Her Place at Academic and Behavior School West



Harris County Department of Education's Academic and Behavior Schools provide trusted, enriching, and supportive learning for students with intellectual or developmental disabilities. With low student-toteacher ratios, many Harris County students receive the support they need to reach their goals. This is certainly the case for 18-year-old Angelica Garcia.

Garcia suffers from auditory, visual, and orthopedic impairments and has attended various school districts, including the Texas State School for the Blind, to find a place that meets her needs. After being dismissed from the School for the Blind due to behavior issues, she was sent back to Houston where parents Rolando and Yoahanka enrolled her in Harris County Department of Education's AB School West through a contract with a local school district. Garcia has been at AB School West since February 2016 and her family has already seen tremendous progress.

"I'm very proud of Angelica," said Mother Yoahanka. "She is visibly happier since attending AB School West and looks forward to going to school every day."

Described by her teachers and therapists as friendly, determined, and independent, Garcia is thriving in her new school environment. She recently received the perfect attendance award and is currently on the honor roll. Her family has also mentioned she is calmer and happier outside of school.

At AB School West, Garcia works daily with special education teacher Anderson Thompson III and blind/deaf intervener Gloria See. Working as a team, Thompson handles most of Garcia's instruction, while See serves as Garcia's eyes and ears to connect Garcia to the classroom and her peers. See also has a special connection with Garcia and has been working with her on and off since she was 5 years old.

Thompson and See use direct instruction with Garcia, a teaching approach that is skills-oriented and teacherdirected. This approach emphasizes the use of smallgroup, face-to-face instruction by teachers using carefully articulated lessons in which cognitive skills are broken down into small units.

This kind of specialized instruction and care in the classroom creates an enriching learning environment for Garcia, as well as the 83 other students who attend AB School West.

"The atmosphere of the school creates opportunities for student success," explains Thompson. "Because we work with smaller groups of students, we can engage them and provide them with the attention they need. They feel a sense of accomplishment here."
