My week began with a meeting of the Executive Leadership Team (ELT), followed by our annual budget meetings- hosted by the Business Services division-where I welcomed staff. These meetings are part of our systemic processes related to our commitment to financial transparency.

I attended my ongoing SuperMENtor reading session this week through our Area I Head Start program. I encourage every Board Member to become part of this invaluable program. It can truly change the life of a child-instilling a love for reading, while also exposing them to men who are committed to making a difference within the community.

Yesterday, I conducted Agenda Review, along with other internal meetings, and today, I am out of the office on personal leave.

This week in the area of teaching and learning, HCDE hosted the following workshops and training sessions: Harris County ELAR; Leadership Team; Attendance Officer's Share Session; School Finance Council; and Addressing Student Misconceptions in Science for grades k-3. Additionally, the Center for Safe and Secure Schools hosted an Incident Command System training (applicable to ISDs/schools), part of the National Incident Management System which came about after the September 11, 2001 tragedy. It was developed by Homeland Security under the George W. Bush administration. The training was comprised of representatives from numerous school districts, in addition to HCDE staff ranging from Head Start Centers, HCDE schools, and divisions within the Department.

Looking ahead into next week, I will conduct ELT Monday morning, followed by a meeting with another mentee. I have other meetings scheduled with superintendents from our client school districts as I continue to keep my finger on the pulse of services we provide. These meetings are informative and help us become even more attuned to the evolving needs of our client districts. I will also attend next week's PFC Meeting.

The TABSE Conference is being held next week and I will serve as keynote speaker for the Distinguished Gentlemen's Dinner and I will also be presenting at the Superintendent's Pipeline event. I will present **Leadership Juno: Samurai to Shogun**.

As always, thank you for your service to HCDE. I look forward to seeing you at Tuesday's PFC Meeting, and please be reminded that the February meeting of the Board will be held Wednesday, February 27. There is no March Board Meeting.
