HCDE Recognizes Cybersecurity Safety Month with Student Data Safety Tips



October is designated as Cybersecurity Awareness Month. Harris County Department of Education Digital Education's David McGeary provides four tips to help keep students and their data safe when working online.

1. Be aware of who has access to your devices or who may be able to see your screen when you are online.

There is a saying amongst hackers: "If I can get physical access to your device, then I can own it." Whether you're watching a video on YouTube or logging in to a laptop while waiting for the bus, try to stay aware of the access that others may have to your devices or the content on your screens.

2. Treat your data like you would treat your most prized possession.

You would never leave your phone or gaming system out on your porch overnight, so don't do the same with your personal data. Before you use a new online service (whether at home or at school), be sure to read the "terms of service" or the "privacy policies," and share them with your parents. This information can usually be found at the bottom of a site's main page (or the settings of a phone app) and spells out what data is being used by the app and how it is handled.

3. Use strong and unique passwords for all the services that you use. Where possible, have more than one way to authenticate your accounts.

We've all done it. We create a simple, easy-to-remember password for Instagram or Gmail. Then we use that password for a lot of different things. Before too long, we're using the same password to access Steam library as we do to access our grades. The best policy for passwords: Make them random. Include numbers, letters and special characters. Use a unique password for every major account you have.

4. If you see something, say something.

If a person or online app is suspicious, it never hurts to report the observation. If you receive a message from a stranger on social media, don't respond. Screenshot the message and submit to appropriate authorities. Don't ever give away access to your personal information or personal photos.

Students, Nutrition Directors Activate their Taste-Buds for HCDE Choice Partners Annual Child Nutrition and Product Expo Oct. 11

Expo on Oct. 11 from 9 a.m.-1 p.m. through Harris County Department of Education's Choice Partners Cooperative. The "Lights! Camera! Nutrition!" retro, Hollywood-themed event features 140 food and product vendors at the Humble Civic Center, 8233 Will Clayton Parkway in Humble, Texas.

About 60 nutrition directors from school districts, charters and community colleges participate in the expo. Many bring their students along to taste-test their products which may eventually make their way into the Choice Partners purchasing cooperative. Students and directors grade the vendors' offerings.

Foods trending this year include the following:

• Hand-held, food-truck type items and culturally-influenced foods with distinctive spices for flavoring. MCI Los Cabos introduces three flavors of a handmade, one-fisted, foil-wrapped, taqueria-style burrito for authentic look and taste. Rich Products provides a new whole-grain flatbread for making banh mi street tacos or gyro sandwiches.

- Clean-label items with no artificial colors or flavors, free of nitrites/nitrates, gluten, MSG, hormones or steroids and void of the top eight allergens.
- Jennie-O Turkey Store delivers an all-natural line which includes a turkey burger and turkey coins, pre-sliced and fully cooked.

"As the school nutrition directors evaluate nutritional value and their students' opinions, Choice Partners gathers information needed to plan for future food contract purchases for school districts," said Trisha Jensen, assistant director of Choice Partners.

Food is purchased annually by school districts in the Harris County area for



more than 85 million student lunches through contracts available through HCDE Choice Partners cooperative.
