By bringing ISD's, law enforcement and other advocacy agencies together to collaborate about school safety, HCDE is leveraging our support in the community for the betterment of local districts and the children and staff they serve. This week we also kicked off CASE Debates and Head Start's Super MENTor program. Both of these initiatives rely upon community engagement and involvement to directly support student achievement and success. This impact can also be seen upon the thousands of students who engage in CASE debates afterschool, guided by professionals from the University of Houston and the Houston Urban Debate League. CASE Providers Fair Offers Variety of Activities

From creating music to robotics to fencing, it could all be found at this year's Center for Afterschool, Summer and Enrichment, or CASE for Kids Providers Fair to explore additional services to offer to afterschool students.

Afterschool providers throughout greater Harris County use the vendor show to find providers for their program.

About 60 providers networked with schools on Oct. 11 to showcase their products and even a few students had their chance to test some out.

School Safety Forum Receives Positive Acclaim from Attendees, Supports Efforts of Senate Bill 11

Concerns over implementing new mental health initiatives in schools and general care for school safety brought approximately 273 educators to Harris County Department of Education Oct. 15 for the School Safety Forum. The event hosted by the Center for Safe and Secure Schools and the Harris County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) supplied international and local speakers on topics ranging from mental health to gang violence to emergency operations planning. Those included Harris County Sheriff Ed Gonzalez, renowned psychologist Scott Poland and emergency preparedness expert Michael Dorn.

Many administrators attended to learn more about mental health and compliance with Senate Bill 11, a bill supported by Gov. Greg Abbott as an effort to prevent school violence and protect Texas children.

"The bill better prepares and equips schools to handle security threats and provide resources to support the mental health of students and staff," said CSSS Director Julia Andrews. "The center is committed to helping our area districts with school safety concerns."

Superintendent James Colbert Jr. welcomed the administrators and safety experts as the forum opened: "I ask you to find something purposeful out of what you learn today so that we can all be proactive at trying to prevent some of these problems," Colbert said.

Assistant principal Raymond Lowery from Alief ISD said he came to the forum to learn about what the community is doing overall to keep schools safe and what kind of preventative measures are in place to help him gauge where his campus stands in terms of school safety enhancements. He left reassured about his campus and district's social and emotional learning efforts and safety updates.

Cy-Fair ISD Middle Schoolers Take Action in Hurricane Preparedness

The Houston area has been hit by numerous tropical storms and hurricanes in the past, and the public may not know what happens behind the scenes with emergency personnel. Thanks to a collaboration between multiple agencies, several dozen students were educated about the role of first responders.

More than 40 eighth graders from Cy-Fair ISD's Hamilton Middle School participated in an interactive exercise with the Harris County Office of Emergency Management and Harris County Department of Education's Center for Safe and Secure Schools, where they formed their own government and planned and recovered from a major weather event.

StormZone is a program out of Miami, FL that teaches students about the science of severe natural hazards, the effects of climate change, and how emergency management agencies work with local governments to prepare for and recover from such disaster.

"I've always wanted to bring this program to the rest of the gulf coast especially to students in Texas," said StormZone Executive Director Lucien C. Proby III. "We look forward to coming out each year and educating a new group of students about preparing and recovering from hurricane-related disasters.

Hamilton Middle School Principal Kim Sempe said that the eighth graders are beginning to look at their high school endorsement program to see what careers interest them and choose high school electives for next year.

"We're excited to have this unique and special hands-on opportunity with StormZone and the Harris County Office of Emergency Management," she said. "The challenges students participated in ties into some of eighth grade focus and curriculum. This also gave them the chance to talk to professionals from a variety of professions in one place."

Eighth-grader Ryan Wolfram portrayed the county judge during the mock exercise.

"I was assigned to oversee everyone doing their respective duties and after each challenge I read aloud what each did to solve the problem," Wolfram said. "I thought it was a great experience and something that I will hold with me forever."

New School Year Welcomes SuperMENTors

Students at the Fifth Ward Head Start Center greeted their favorite SuperMENTors with smiles and hugs as their adult volunteers came to ready “Bear’s Big Day” to them Oct. 9.

The four men volunteer for the REAL SuperMENTors Read program, a mentoring program in which men from the Houston community commit one hour of their time to read, once a month. The program is a part of the ongoing HCDE Head Start Significant Male Initiative formed in 2002 to encourage male involvement throughout the HCDE Head Start centers.

The program works by recruiting, selecting and assigning mentors to each school. Mentors commit to at least one hour, once a month between October and May to read to students. During the month of May children celebrate their SuperMENTors.

Chris Frey, Bank of Texas vice president of commercial banking, is in his fourth year of participating in the SuperMENTor program and is one of three from the bank to mentor at the Fifth Ward Head Start Center. Bank of Texas also donated to the program this year to supply books.

“It’s always great getting to know the new students,” he said. “They were super engaged and eager as they are every year. I love doing it and look forward to it the most every month.”

Frey also said the great thing about the program is that he gets to see the same students throughout the year and by the end of the year they all know his name.

“I find that part very rewarding especially being able to see them progress in the learning experience through the school year is a great feeling and they definitely make my day,” Frey said.

SuperMENTor volunteers come from a multitude of businesses and are community members from across the greater Houston area. Additionally, through corporate sponsors, participating students receive a copy of the book read to them each month to grow a home library.

Reading dates are the second Thursday of each month beginning in October through May. Each school site will work with its mentor, as needed, for scheduling reading dates.


