It's been a great week at HCDE! Hopefully, on last Friday, you had an opportunity to see some of our students appear on the front page of the City/State section of the Houston Chronicle in a feature photo. Students from the Academic and Behavior School-West Campus participated in the Quad Copter Challenge. The event, which offered the students skills in teamwork, decision-making, fine- and gross-motor skills, and directional awareness, took place last Thursday. The newspaper photo from the event was captioned, A Thrilling Flight of Fancy. What a great experience for our students, and what top-notch, above-the-fold exposure for HCDE! Because of our busy weeks, the summer is moving swiftly. On Monday of this week, we hosted three innovative workshops for area educators and other school and county officials. A cutting-edge mathematics workshop entitled, "Cooling the Curriculum Hot Spots in Math" was geared for educators of grades K-2. It focused on standards related to numbers and operations, algebraic reasoning, and data analysis. "You Gotta Have Art" celebrated its 10th Annual Workshop. This annual HCDE event emphasizes the importance of integrating art into curricula, and offers creative methods of implementation. Our Center for Safe and Secure Schools hosted an introduction to the Incident Command System which was beneficial to safety and security officials across Harris County.

On Tuesday, the math workshop continued for grades 3-5. It focused on the same standards, just at a higher level of learning, consistent with the higher grade levels. Due to ever-increasing interests in expanding math expectations, these workshops were certainly timely.

Yesterday, the School Finance Council convened and school district business officials addressed pertinent issues related to school finance. We also facilitated an informative science-based training, "Rocks from Space and Engineering- Early Solar System Clues about Earth." And, on tomorrow, the BEST Plus Refresher Toolkit training will be held. This toolkit training is associated with testing adults for English Proficiency. The course serves as a refresher for educators in the adult education population who are end-users of the system. Finally, from Tuesday through yesterday, we hosted Joe Paneitz, of Aha Education, who facilitated a summer workshop for students in grades 6-8 that promotes robotics problem-solving for the purpose of creating medical biotech robotics. This was certainly a week filled with rich training opportunities facilitated by experts from various respective fields for educators within our 25 school districts and across Harris County. HCDE consistently creates value, provides opportunity, and delivers service.

Meanwhile, this week, Assistant Superintendent Parker and I met with the District Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent of Special Education of Goose Creek ISD to discuss our partnership with them in meeting the needs of their student population. It was a productive forum and we hope to continue to build upon that meeting. I also met with representatives from the Greater Houston Partnership this week in an effort to enhance HCDE's relationships with the corporate community in an effort to benefit the Department and its programs, services, and clients through various pathways.

Our staff continues to prepare for the upcoming academic session. They, too, are engaged in professional development, at all levels, to ensure best practices in pedagogy. Other program staff remains involved in the day-to-day management of our diverse summer programs. At the same time, we're gearing up for the Annual Staff Meeting which is just weeks away now.



Summer Robotics Camp Focuses on Robotics Related to Medical Biotech Solutions



Joe Paneitz, owner of Aha Education, LLC, an education and consulting company, hosted a summer workshop at HCDE for children in grades 3-8 on July 20-22. The workshop promoted robotics problem-solving for the purpose of creating medical biotech robotics.

"We're approaching the physical challenges of human beings and

creating solutions with robotic programming and engineering," said Panietz, who also teaches at Channelview ISD.

Challenges for the 15 students attending the three-day camp included navigating through a room blindfolded and being guided using sensor technology to provide





solutions for the visually impaired. Students from Pearland, Klein, Humble, and Houston independent school districts attended the camp.
