It's hard to believe that we're already approaching Spring Break. This academic year is moving at a rapid pace. I started this week with a meeting of my Executive Leadership Team followed by a meeting with the Leadership Team this past Tuesday. I also met with Mr. Tom Brooks, the Executive Director of the Harris County Juvenile Probation Department on that day. The meeting was informative as I learned more about the Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Programs.

On Wednesday, Human Resources executive director Natasha Truitt and I met with officials from the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) as they performed a regularly-scheduled review of our organization and compensation structure, ensuring alignment with comparable education entities across the state. Also, I had the pleasure of visiting both Academic and Behavior School-East (during Career Day festivities) and Highpoint East. The ABS-East career day was a well-organized event, with 15 agencies and businesses represented to expose our students to possible future careers. Among the many groups represented were the Texas Department of Safety (DPS), Houston Fire Department (HFD), and Houston Police Department (HPD). Yesterday, I fulfilled my monthly American Leadership Forum responsibility as a member of the 2016-2017 class. As mentioned in previous issues of **The Connector**, The American Leadership Forum (ALF) is a nonprofit organization whose mission is to join and strengthen diverse leaders to serve the common good. This occurs through a yearlong Fellows Program in which leaders engage in dialogue, explore differences, and build relationships. This meeting consistently provides additional enlightenment as we also propose to educate students who are in recovery from substance use disorder. I am pleased to say that all of our campuses are providing impeccable service to both the students and districts we serve.

Purchasing Co-Op Rolls Out Time-Saving JOC Trades Contract



Choice Partners. HCDE's purchasing cooperative, held an event for Harris County-area businesses and government entities to discuss a new contract that will increase efficiency. Thirty-five members and 16 vendors attended the

JOC Trades Rollout on Wednesday, March 8, where they networked with each other and heard a presentation about the intricacies of government purchasing.

"Very useful," said co-op member Bahman Yazdani, associate director, Energy Systems Laboratory, Texas A&M Engineering Experiment Station. Yazdani exchanged business cards with a rep from Aggieland Construction, one of the newly-awarded contract holders also present at the event.

The on-call JOC trades contract "lowers overhead cost," explained Stephen Kendrick, contract compliance specialist, HCDE. He added that it also simplifies the procurement process by allowing member entities to contract directly with the



trades specialists they need, rather than going through a larger contractor and sub-contracting for specific needs.
