I am pleased to report that we have concluded the budget hearing phase of our budget planning process for the 2017-2018 fiscal year. Leaders from each of our divisions and programs presented to the Budget Committee a Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats (SWOT) analyses, as well as respective budget projections for next fiscal year. Our annual budget hearing process proves to be effective and it ensures an efficient budget model. I look forward to presenting to the Board a fully-vetted budget, consistent with our priorities, mission, and goals.

I began this week with a meeting of my Executive Leadership Team followed by the series of final budget hearing sessions as well as the regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Trustees. Tomorrow and next Saturday, April 29, 2017, we expect about 1,000 young robotics enthusiasts in grades 4-8 throughout greater

Harris County for the All-Earth Ecobot Challenge. Tomorrow's event will be held at the Berry Center from 8:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. and next week's event will take place at the Humble Civic Center during the same time. While your attendance is not required, you are certainly invited to attend.

HCDE Director Joins Deborah Duncan's Televised Education Panel, Sits Next to Fonzie



Darlene Breaux, curriculum director for special populations at HCDE's Teaching and Learning Center, appeared on KHOU-Channel 11's Great Day Houston program on April 28. The popular morning show is hosted by Deborah Duncan.

Breaux joined guest Henry Winkler, actor and children's book author, to talk about dyslexia and other learning differences. Winkler is best known for playing Arthur "The Fonz" Fonzarelli on the 1970s sitcom Happy Days, but since 2003 he has co-authored a series of children's books that feature a main character with dyslexia – a fourth-grader named Hank Zipzer.



Both Breaux and Winkler shared stories about growing up with dyslexia and how many of their teachers misunderstood them. They both managed to overcome isolation and stigma to achieve both academic and professional success.

"I was a tube of toothpaste in the school play, and I had one line that I couldn't remember," Winkler said of his early difficulties with dyslexia, adding that he learned to improvise to get around his challenges with reading.

"Dyslexia is hereditary," Breaux said, explaining that her father's dyslexia prevented him from advancing beyond the third grade. On air, she told a story about how her father took an active role in helping her achieve her goal of going to college. Breaux now has a Master's degree and is pursuing doctorate studies of dyslexia.

HCDE Spotlight: Employee Ross Daniel Collaborates with Community to Benefit Head Start Students



As a mother of four daughters, grandmother of two and manager of the Head Start Compton Center, Mervonna Ross-Daniel is no stranger to a busy schedule. Since the Compton Head Start program is housed in the Compton Community Center in northeast Houston, Ross-Daniel has the unique experience

of collaborating with city employees and local seniors who attend programs at the community center, in addition to managing her 25 employees and 131 students.

“I enjoy collaborating with the community center to ensure our families are getting a positive, engaging, and effective learning environment for their students,” says Ross-Daniel.

Some of the ways the community center gets involved with Head Start is through the garden program and field day. Local seniors at the community center read to Compton students and assist with their four on-site gardens. Since staff of Tidwell Park are located in the Compton Community Center, the students participate in a field and game day with assistance from the recreation staff providing engagement and involvement from the community.

“I believe the more involvement, love, support, and guidance a child receives, the more likely they are to be successful in life,” says Ross-Daniel. “That’s what we provide at Compton.”

Ross-Daniel first found her calling for Head Start while taking classes at San Jacinto College North. Her Child

Development professor informed her of an upcoming Head Start Job Fair, and since 2001 she has been making a daily impact on children and families in the Head Start program.

Throughout her career, she has served as a teaching assistant, teacher, assistant center manager, and center manager at multiple Head Start centers. She has been center manager at Compton since July 2015.

Even though Ross-Daniel isn’t in the classroom full-time anymore, she loves being able to interact with the students on a daily basis. She considers herself blessed to see the development of students in the Head Start program and contribute to their growth. She recalls a young girl, 3, who began the 2015-16 school year unable to speak.

“When she first came to the program, she was not vocal and would only point to things in the classroom,” Ross-Daniel recalls. “With the help of our Compton teachers, she is now saying words and interacting with other children and staff.”

Collaborating with multiple organizations within the community center can be a tiresome job, but Ross-Daniel has a strong support system to lean on. As a mother and grandmother, she spends her downtime with family doing activities they enjoy such as camping, shopping, and participating in Girl Scouts.

Harris County Department of Education Board Approves Plans for First Public Recovery School in Harris County



HCDE Board of Trustees voted 4-0 on April 18 to approve the budgeting and implementation of a recovery high school, the first public Harris County substance-use

prevention high school. The Texas Education Agency has reported that in a given year, there are over 11,000 Harris County students that have had drug offense issues, per TEA Disciplinary Data Products.

The school will be available to all 25 school districts in Harris County on a contractual basis, and will serve 30 students as it is opened with a target date of September 2017. HCDE will renovate a 20,000-square-foot HCDE school facility located in the Greenspoint area in north Houston at 11902 Spears Road. The HCDE Board of Trustees approved \$950,000 in start-up funding for the project.

“It’s a good thing we are doing this because it’s a chance to help students in a revolutionary way,” said HCDE Board Vice President Eric Dick. “I had a troubled youth and am glad to be a solution to the problem.”

The goal of the recovery high school is to provide support and assistance to students after successful completion of a rehabilitation program. Students continue to receive counseling and support as they attend their school.

A low student-to-teacher ratio will be implemented as the school provides an academic curriculum along with life skills and recovery coaching. Staff at the school will include teachers, recovery coaches, and counselors. The school will accept students from all areas of Harris County.

“We recognize those who struggle each day in the fight against addiction—the students, parents, teachers, and community,” said Harris County School Superintendent James Colbert, Jr. “This school represents a big step in recovery for students in Harris County.”

1,000 Robotics Enthusiasts Expected for Ecobot April 22 and 29 at Two Venues



More than 1,000 young robotics enthusiasts in grades 4-8 throughout greater Harris County come together for the 9th annual All-Earth Ecobot Challenge on two consecutive Saturdays,

April 22 and 29 from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Their challenges include maritime missions, vaccine development, flood control, and forest firefighting.

The All-Earth Ecobot Challenge is coordinated by the Education Foundation of Harris County and the Center for Afterschool, Summer and Enrichment for Kids, or CASE for Kids, a division of Harris County Department of Education.

The challenge is one of the largest robotics events for students in Texas and has touched the lives of 6,000 students since its inception.

The students work on their robotics challenges using the Lego Mindstorm kits in their afterschool programs and through community organizations.

“These children are our future programmers, scientists, and forward-thinking leaders of the next generation,” said James Colbert, Jr., HCDE superintendent. “We are teaching teamwork and higher-level thinking skills like problem-solving. Along the way, these youth meet corporate mentors who are volunteers and sponsors.”

Robotics has become a mainstay as a youth hobby, just like cheerleading, soccer, or chess. Robotics is also embedded into careers as companies look for new talent and lend support to future young engineers.
