This week was a busy one at HCDE. I began the week, as usual, with a meeting of my Executive Leadership Team. On Wednesday of this week, I hosted the first Focal Point meeting of this academic year. This meeting was part of my one-year commitment to the ALF as I complete my requirements as part of the 2016-2017 class. The ALF is an excellent professional development vehicle. HCDE greatly benefits from the association with this distinguished group of local professionals and leaders.

This week in the area of teaching and learning, the schedule was chock-full of diverse trainings and workshops as we trained the trainers and empowered educators within Harris County. Throughout the week we hosted a vast variety of workshops including two Online Instructors' Training sessions, Parts I and III. In the content areas, we facilitated mathematics sessions including Improve Problem Solving in Operations and Algebraic Reasoning, as well as Fractions, Decimals, Percents, and

Operations in Grades 5 and 6. We hosted the Social Studies Leadership Group as well as Social-Studies Strategies for ELLs. We brought together science educators with a meeting of the Houston Science Educators Leadership Association as well as with the workshop, Raising the Bar: Literacy Strategies in Science. In the area of classroom management and innovative learning, we offered Knock the Walls out of Your Classroom and Connect Your Students Globally!, Snapshot: 21st Century- Raising the Academic Bar and Risk Mitigation, Strategies for an Effective Co-Teaching Program, as well as To Refer or Not Refer: On the Right Track-An Overview of RTI. In the area of reading and writing, we hosted STAAR and The Mentor Text: Sentence by Sentence, Building Better Writers for Grades 4 and 7 and Integrating Literacy Practices in Afterschool. We also empowered school district personnel by increasing their chances to increase their resources through a Quest for Grants Training Series: The Basics of Grant Writing. In the alternative certification realm, we hosted yet another Educator Certification and Professional Advancement (ECPA) Career Choice Recruitment Seminar, as well as a Principal Certification Academy Information Meeting. And if that wasn't enough, we helped keep students safe through a CPR and First Aid training class. HCDE continues to provide value, opportunity, and service as we help the students of Harris County achieve by offering these much needed opportunities for professional development to educators.

Please be reminded that the regularly scheduled September Board Meeting will be held Tuesday, September 20, 2016 at 1:00 p.m. Also next week, as you are aware, the TASA/TASB Convention will be held in Houston, Friday through Sunday, September 23-25, 2016, at the George R. ESL Contextualized Classes Begin with TAS Concrete

Adult Education is partnering with site-based partner



TAS Concrete, one of Houston's largest specialty contractors, to begin training approximately 800 employees to improve their English, as well as safety and productivity skills. Workplace classes take place in the evenings and on Saturdays, with 50 students at various worksites in contextualized English, or classes that specifically teach English and workplace terminology. A workforce grant will fund the classes. The venture is part of

HCDE's strategy to reach out to local employers who are committed to improving the skills of their workforce.

Workforce registration days begin this month for fall classes at numerous Adult Education locations throughout Harris County. The classes attract adult students interested in obtaining, retaining, or advancing in a job or developing a career pathway. The students receive additional support from counselors and transition specialists to overcome educational and personal barriers to employment in the careers of their choice.

Backpack Safety Tips Issued for 2016-2017 School Year from Harris County Department of Education's School-Based Therapy Services



Those books in your children's backpacks are important, but practice caution as students take to the hallways and travel home carrying heavy loads.

Jean Polichino, Harris County Department of Education School-Based Therapy Services senior director and occupational therapist, urges parents to

consider several factors in consideration of their child's back health.

Backpack safety tips:

- Choose the right size backpack: A small student needs a small backpack.
- The backpack should fit snugly, with the backpack bottom at or slight below the waistline.
- Load the heaviest items closest to the child's back.
- Observe the 10 percent rule: A 50 pound student should only carry five pounds.

Awareness about the potential strain of backpacks is a back-to-school initiative from Harris County Department of Education's School-Based Therapy Services division in collaboration with the American Occupational Therapy Association.

Upon graduating from the program, student Gomez taught two years in Aldine before being promoted to bilingual literacy coach. Gomez continued to receive support from ECPA through monthly professional development sessions. This year, she is the response to intervention coordinator and coaches other teachers. She credits her success to the extensive, ongoing training and personalized support during and after completing the teacher training program at HCDE.
