It was a productive week at HCDE. As usual, I began the week with my regularly scheduled meetings, including my Monday morning meeting with ELT. At that time, we continued discussions and brainstorming on how we could offer assistance to Harris County school districts in the aftermath of the storm. The meeting was filled with great ideas and offered reassurance that our programs continue to move forward in meeting the needs of the students and educators of Harris County.

Thanks for your attendance and support at both the Board Budget Committee Meeting and the regularly scheduled Wednesday Board Meeting. I am pleased that for the third consecutive year, the Department was able to propose a tax rate of 0.005195, below the effective tax rate of 0.005236. For the remainder of the week, I attended other standing meetings while ensuring the consistency of HCDE programs and services with so many of our employees having been affected by Hurricane Harvey. I am pleased to report that we have offered employees the opportunity to participate in an employee giving campaign through payroll deduction via the Education Foundation of Harris County. Employees may elect to have funds deducted each payroll period to benefit Hurricane Harvey-impacted employees. Collected monies will be evenly distributed among impacted employees. All processes will flow through the proper payroll functions and systems and all contributions will be tax deductible.

This week, in the area of teaching and learning, HCDE hosted the following workshops and training sessions: Harris County English Language Arts Leadership Team; Harris County Social Studies Leadership Team; Effective Grant Research; and School Finance Council. The Department continues to serve as a leader in professional development for educators across Harris County and beyond.

Looking ahead into next week, HCDE will host its regularly scheduled IMPACT meeting on Monday. Later that day, I will be involved in a meeting regarding the Fortis Academy Development Plan. I will be in Austin on Tuesday and Wednesday making a site visit to an Austin area recovery school, University High (powered by the University of Texas), as we prepare to open Fortis Academy. Also accompanying me on this site visit will be Mr. Mays, Dr. Moten, and Assistant Superintendent Jonathan Parker. (They will also make a site visit to another leading recovery school in Laredo, Texas next week.) Upon my return to the office Thursday, I will attend my monthly Northwest Assistance Ministries Board Meeting and will also attend a lunch meeting with representatives from the United Way.

Again, thanks for your ongoing service to and support of HCDE. I hope you enjoy this issue of **The Connector** and I hope you have a relaxing weekend.
