Thank you to those of you who were able to make the budget workshop on Wednesday afternoon. As you know, leadership puts an enormous amount of time, energy and thought into planning for how we will spend our financial resources each year. We are always conscious that we are spending taxpayer dollars and so we diligently demonstrate financial prudence when creating our budget. I take a tremendous amount of pride in having been able to systematically lower the tax rate for the last five years while increasing services and holding our fees steady. As I mentioned at the workshop, in my nine years as a superintendent, I have never presented a board with a deficit budget. And I never plan to.

That being said, I appreciated the conversation about staff salaries and benefits and how we work hard to balance all facets of our budget. I look forward to continued discussion about the budget in the coming weeks before we present you with the final version for adoption at the July board meeting.

This week we started our flex schedule, which translates to longer days in the office Monday through Thursday (regular hours are now 7 a.m. to 5 p.m.) I met with the Executive Leadership Team on Monday and then met internally with staff about various projects throughout the week. On Wednesday, after the budget workshop, I met with staff from Precinct 2 Commissioner Adrian Garcia's office. I capped off the shorter work week with a Northwest Houston Chamber of Commerce luncheon on Thursday and more internal meetings.

The last week or so has also been filled with exciting staff events including a celebration of National Donut Day last Friday at both the Irvington and NPO locations and an ice cream break to beat the heat on Wednesday afternoon. On the other side of the spectrum, staff also participated in health and fitness seminars focused on meal planning and healthy dietary habits this week, also sponsored by Human Resources.

In the area of teaching and learning this week, HCDE hosted the monthly School Finance Council, with CFOs from area school districts coming together to talk all things school finance as well as professional development for elementary school teachers in Guided Reading practices for students in grades 3-5. Our divisions continue to guide school staff through continued refinement of their craft in support of student achievement. I am proud of how HCDE is a solid resource for continuous improvement in our industry.

Head Start Helps Shape Mother and Son's Futures



When Tasha Crockett was growing up in Livingston, Texas, her parents enrolled her into the Head Start program to help her get the social and academic skills she needed for school.

Fast-forward to April 2008 when her son, Christian, turned 3 years old and was set to enroll in the Harris County Department of Education Head Start Program in Humble.

"I knew I wanted him in the program because it's family-centered, it helped me grow when I was his age and I knew it would help him, too, especially with his speech impediment and dyslexia," she said.

The program continued to shape her as a parent volunteer with the policy council.

"I was going through a divorce at the time and participating with the Head Start Policy Council was life-saving by helping with the changes I was going through," Crockett said.

Being involved with decision-making in regard to hiring and academics motivated her to go back to school to get a degree in social work. She graduated summa cum laude from the University of Houston-Downtown in December 2018 and will receive her master's degree in May 2020 from Stephen F. Austin State University.

As she was learning so was Christian because of the programs Head Start offered. He started speech therapy at age 2 and his therapist continued working with him during the two years he was at the Humble center.

"His academics and personality blossomed during those two years," Crockett said. "He even graduated early from speech therapy. He would have been in longer if he didn't have the help from the therapist and Head Start."

Christian is now a well-rounded middle school student and his teachers have said they would have never guessed he had a speech impediment.
