### **ABS West Construction Update for January**

Although December was a short month for local school districts, contractors reported steady progress on construction of our new Academic and Behavior School West. The school construction is on-track and scheduled for completion this spring.

### Updates on the school follow:

- The sensory room design has been finalized with the theme "under the sea." The room features interactive equipment and was designed to benefit our students with intellectual, developmental and behavioral disorders. Students' senses are stimulated by the visuals, lights, sounds and touch.
- HVAC is ready for startup, pending power restoration by CenterPoint. (After being stalled by a CenterPoint Energy power outage, the energy company reported it will restore power this week.)
- Plumbing is near completion.
- · Restroom walls are tiled; floors are staged for completion.
- · Restroom fixtures, partitions, ceiling tiles are scheduled after flooring is installed.
- · Gym construction is almost complete-awaiting tiles, flooring, hand-painted mural.
- · Cafeteria is near completion.
- · Ballistic-rated walls in the bus drop-off area are installed and passed manufacturer's inspection.
- · Glass in lobby (ballistic rated) is scheduled for installment later this month.

### Ecobot 2020 Issues Recycle Challenge through Reveal Day

The All-Earth Ecobot Challenge officially kicked off in December with the elementary reveal day held at 6300 Irvington provided by CASE for Kids. Three dozen teachers and parents from schools in Houston, Cleveland, Galena Park, New Caney, Aldine, Huffman and Cy-Fair and several charter schools attended the reveal.

This year's theme for the elementary school challenge is Ecobot Kingdom with an emphasis on creating a recycle kingdom where students reduce, reuse, recycle and rethink. Coordinator and award-winning Humble teacher Joe Panietz led the educators through the new challenge and rules.

Lego Mindstorm robotics kits are used as students defend their kingdoms through a tabletop challenge through their program robots. The challenge is an innovative engineering competition that engages students in complex problemsolving while developing critical thinking skills and elevating their confidence in formulating solutions to real-world missions.

New to the challenge is an actual recycling competition to be held at each school campus.

The elementary Ecobot Challenge for fourth through sixth graders will be held on April 18 at the Gerald D. Young Agriculture Center in Katy ISD. ### Professional Development for Head Start Staff Kicks off New Year

At some point during the first 18 months of infancy, research shows that every child diagnosed with autism departs from the typical brain development pathway.

Head Start staff from 15 area centers returned to work for professional development Jan. 6 to learn more about subjects ranging from cognitive development to classroom management to updates in state operations and licensing procedures.

Ann McKitrick with Texas Childcare Training tried a hands-on training project giving staff simple tasks with balls, then adding complex directions. The adults, like their young students, were challenged with the tasks which weren't reinforced.

"See what happens when you try to learn too much at one time," the trainer said. "If your brain has too much going on, we can't really focus."

Head Start Senior Director Venetia Peacock said the training sessions for staff are ongoing throughout the year and equip staff with the tools they need as teacher professionals.

Classes for both Head Start and Schools students began Jan. 7.

Head Start staff gathered here Jan 6., returning to work after a restful holiday break. Because it is essential for our staff to understand how preschool children learn, we provided professional development on cognitive growth. As you know, children ages 3-5 soak up knowledge like sponges. However, they need repetition and patterning to learn. Too much too soon equals overload.

Teachers learned about cognitive development as well as conditions like autism through our professional development. These sessions are integral to the success of our teachers and ultimately their Head Start students and their families. In addition to hosting Head Start training, we invited teachers throughout Harris County to learn about the Ecobot Challenge 2020 through the reveal day. The Ecobot curriculum grows more enriched with STEM materials each year. This year, contestants will recycle at their respective schools and meet with recycle personnel in local businesses to learn about career paths in conservation.

We also bring a progress report about ABS West and its construction status. Staff, our students and our client districts are excited about moving into the school this spring. Each day of progress via construction brings us closer to that goal. I hope you'll enjoy reading the latest update!

By offering quality professional development to staff and educators in Harris County and by routinely keeping abreast of construction progress at the school, I am ensuring that: Quality staff development opportunities should be available to employees, and new effective tools must be available as we determine their applicability to HCDE staff and Harris County educators.
