Of Note...

HCDE continues to make a name for itself in Harris County, Texas and around the country. This week, we hosted a Human Trafficking event for superintendents and board members around the region and visited with representatives from the Hanley Foundation. We kick off our new Superintendent Certification program tomorrow.

Tuesday night, HCDE's Center for Safe and Secure Schools, in partnership with Crime Stoppers, hosted the first of two Human Trafficking training programs in compliance with HB 403. This one-hour training is now required for superintendents and board members from traditional ISDs in efforts to help schools prevent, identify and protect children who are at risk of being subjected to human trafficking efforts. As a major metropolitan city with an active port and close proximity to interstates and the Mexican border, Houston is a hot bed for human trafficking. I am proud the Center is taking an active role in helping to make our communities safer and protect our children. The next training is scheduled for Thursday, October 17 at 5 p.m. here at HCDE. While you are not required to attend this training, you are welcome to come if you are interested in learning more about this growing issue without our society.

The Hanley Foundation is a non-profit organization in Florida, dedicated to providing substance abuse prevention and education programs for parents, caregivers and children. They seek to break the cycle of addiction and support families who have been impacted by drugs or alcohol. On Wednesday, two officers from the foundation joined myself, Mr. Parker, Dr. Mays and Dr. Moten to discuss Fortis Academy, the programs we offer and our philosophy of shifting the paradigm from punishment to support for students struggling with addiction. We toured Fortis Academy and ate a great pasta lunch made by the Fortis culinary students. The foundation representatives were very impressed with our program and consider us pioneers in our efforts to support youth in recovery. CEO Jan Cairnes told me, "You are the premiere recovery high school in the United States. Fortis sets the standard to which other recovery high schools should aspire." They also mentioned their desire to replicate the Fortis model across the country.

I took yesterday and today off for some needed personal time, but will return tomorrow to present to the inaugural class of our new Superintendent Certification program. I have been preparing for this presentation all week, as I take great pride in helping the next generation of school leaders. I am looking forward to imparting wisdom to our participants so they can learn from my experiences and know a little more about what this job is about, how it has changed and what I see as its evolution in the years to come.

I plan to enjoy the beautiful weather this weekend as we transition to fall in Houston. I hope you have a relaxing weekend as well.

ABS West Construction Update: Imelda Delays but Contractors Conquer

Construction at ABS West could be best described as a roller coaster ride last month as Tropical Storm Imelda arrived, but contractors prevailed and were back on schedule soon after.

Within days of drying out, the school met the milestone of the beginning of "drying in." Webber Commercial celebrated the milestone by providing lunch for over 40 guests.

A second milestone was the installation of the CenterPoint terminal pole to begin the permanent, powering-up process.

Progress on the school includes the following: \cdot Gym roof installation

- Roof decking installation is 80 percent complete
- Exterior/interior stud installation is at 30 percent
- HVAC rough-in is 80 percent complete Plumbing rough-in is 50 percent accomplished Electric rough-in is 80 percent complete



As the drying in process begins, ideas are forming for the sensory room design. Several administrators visited sensory room installations at Robert Driscoll Elementary in Robstown ISD and Olson Elementary in Port Aransas ISD and brought back ideas and inspiration for design.

As construction at ABS West reaches a midway point and the roofing is nearing completion, we begin the drying-in process and the building takes shape. Timelapse cameras give us a clear picture of the progress, and we look forward to reaching the goal of our February deadline.



Within our Department, we continue to recruit the best candidates to educate our youngest population as we host the Head Start job fair Oct. 18. We look forward to interviewing several hundred candidates for jobs including teachers, teaching assistants, family service providers and cooks to join any of its 15 locations.

Another event that brings us together is the Lights On Afterschool! Event which gathers families to celebrate music and literature. Afterschool is about keeping families strong as we help keep communities safe. This annual event hosted for our Partnership Project schools on Oct. 24 providers camaraderie between afterschool providers and the families we serve.



Finally, this week we recommended several middle schools who brought pre-teens to go through hurricane-related emergency scenarios with Florida International University staff who are bringing this curriculum to county and city emergency management centers. It helps future generations understand the challenges they will face as future leaders.

These activities correlate with the Board's expectations for me to:

Develop and implement a clear vision for the Department. Develop and foster an entrepreneurial spirt and understand HCDE's role in the changing educational environment. We assess risks and determine appropriate actions using sound business judgement to provide programs and resources that support educational opportunities.
